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Kodiak Island Grizzly Bear Is Seen in Film

Kodiak Island, off the coast of Alaska, is the only place in the world where the great Kodiak grizzly is found in any numbers. This species of bear is the largest carnivorous animal in existence and perhaps the most ferocious. One of these giants charging down upon a hunter is a sight never to be forgotten and many hunters have never lived to tell about it.
