PARIS, Apr. 12 (AP)—Women's costumes of today must breathe harmony, says Lucien Lelong, Paris style creator. To breathe harmony the woman's perfume must match the dress. Only the dress designer can bring this about.

This is the way one master of style explains the motto of the dressmakers of Paris into the lucrative perfume bottling business.

Lucien Lelong comes from a dressmaking family, his father and mother having been heads of the house of Lelong before him.

"Kippoptic line" originated with the house of Lelong. Kippoptic line combines kinetic energy with optic illusion. At least, that is the way it is discovered defines it. It symbolizes, according to Lucien Lelong, the clothes of the modern woman, which should be at once a part of the wearer's personality, and a translation of herself which the world can read, although it should never be thrust upon the world.

The modern woman's perfume, he thinks, should have the same qualities. Therefore few women should wear the same perfumes.

Lucien Lelong is the designer who believes that every line has its color. Some designs from his ateliers are suited only to pale blue, he thinks. The clothes he designs for blue do not always translate into red, and vice versa.

Perfume which harmonizes with a given dress, he warns his women clients, should never be used with a scarlet costume.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Baked flounder, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, cornmeal waffles, maple syrup, milk, tea.

LUNCHEON—Baked cheese custard, cocoanut and fruit salad, whole wheat bread, ginger bread, milk, tea.

DINNER—Tomato bouillon, rolled breast of veal, Martinique potatoes, braised celery, egg and spinach salad, apple whip, butter-scotch cookies, graham rolls, milk, coffee.

Cocoanut and fruit salad is ideal for this time of year when strawberries are not generally plentiful. Fresh or canned cocoanut can be used as preferred or convenient, and fresh or canned pineapple.

Cocoanut and Fruit Salad
One cup sliced strawberries, 1/2 cup shredded pineapple, 1/2 cup shredded cocoanut, 1 tablespoon minced celery, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 4 tablespoons orange juice, 4 tablespoons oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, head lettuce, currant or raspberry jelly.

Combine berries, pineapple, cocoanut and celery and sprinkle with lemon juice. Cover and chill for one hour. Chill orange juice and oil and then shake until thoroughly emulsified. Season with salt and paprika and pour over salad mixture. Serve on crisped and chilled leaves of head lettuce and dot with cubes of bright red jelly.
