The trio of immortal screen horses has become a quartet. To that ultra-select coteria which has hitherto contained only "Tony," "Silver King" and "Rex," has now been added the name of "Flash."

"Flash" hailed as the greatest find of years among four-footed film actors, has been signed to a long-term contract by Paramount, according to announcement by H. P. Schulberg, west coast executive for Famous Players-Lasky.
