A motorist in Chatham, Ont., was arrested the other day and fined \$5 for running on a flat tire, as if he were not having enough trouble already. They're a queer race, those Brits. Fining a man for driving on a bad tire, and thereby making it worse, was obviously nobody's business but his own, and besides was calculated to benefit the tire industry. In this enlightened country that driver would probably stop and fix his leaky tire for a couple of hours right in the middle of a busy thoroughfare. And nobody would arrest him for that, either, though some irate or absent-minded truck driver might run over him.

DETROIT SPEEDERS

The Detroit traffic court proposes to jail 14,000 automobile speeders who have been ignoring court summonses since last December. There must be more fast driving in Detroit than anywhere has imagined, and there must be a mighty busy police force. But evidently something is wrong with the wheels of justice, when 14,000 citizens calmly ignore a police order to appear in court.

The plan now is to assign 10 motorcycle men to the special duty of rounding up those 14,000 delinquent offenders and bringing them into court, where the judge will sentence them all to spend a night in jail. If they try to do it all at once, Detroit will have to use the Ford factory for a jail. But there is doubtless a limit to the amount of rounding up that 10 motorcycle cops can do in one day. And then, while the delinquents are getting what's coming to them, probably thousands of new offenders will ignore new summonses.

The situation shows what happens when any court gets behind in its work. Justice needs to learn modern efficiency. It's better to arrest fewer people and handle them promptly. Merely pretending to arrest offenders, and letting them ignore a summons and fancy they're getting away with it, breeds contempt for the law.

Victorian Beauties Adopt Bobbed Hair And Fall For Short Skirts

MONTE CARLO, Apr. 15 (AP)—Two world famous beauties of 50 years ago live within a stone's throw of each other on the sunny slope overlooking the port of Monaco.

Within the flower covered walls of her villa, Les Lys, Lady de Maitre, better known as Lily Langtry, recalls the glories of the Victorian court. A few yards above her the Villa Les Marquises is the home of Mrs. James Brown-Potter, the famous corn Upright Potter of the stage in the early nineties.

Mrs. Brown-Potter is seventy. The Jersey Lily is seventy-two. But both are young. Mrs. Brown-Potter, as chipper as a debutante, with her snowy white hair elegantly bobbed, still wears the sort of flowing gown of her age of triumph. The Jersey Lily's famous tresses are untouched by the scissors, but she has adopted the short skirts of the flapper.

Reminiscences of the great figures of the past half century are the life blood of these two women. Lily Langtry talks of Swinburne, Rossetti, Wilde, Sarah Bernhardt and the royalty and statesmen of

Aged Documents Are on Display

BEND, Ore., Apr. 15—The personal signatures of four presidents of the United States, John Quincy Adams, Millard Fillmore, Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren, appear on several valued documents owned by John A. Chenoweth of Bend. The documents, one of them a shoe skin, are deeds to land in Illinois.

One of the documents, signed by a president, contains a deed to the grant of bounty land to John Chenoweth, who served as a private in the Kentucky volunteers in the war of 1812. Another is a record of a farm auction held in Illinois in 1849.

GERMANS DRIVE TO POPULARIZE TENNIS

BERLIN—A nation-wide campaign to make tennis a favorite sport in Germany has been launched by the German Tennis Association since its reinstatement into the Davis cup play. The wealth of material from which the teams can be selected is shown by the annual report of the association, which states that there are 559 tennis clubs with a dues-paying membership of 75,000. The association gained 11,000 members last year while 70 new clubs with from three to five courts were organized. The propaganda will be augmented by showings of an American tennis film with slow motion closeups of leading players. The film is to be run at all the member clubs.
