

GOLF SCHEDULE FOR YEAR GIVEN

La Grande Country Club Players to Meet Other Cities' Teams

Although it will be impossible to play on the La Grande country club's new golf course before July, a definite schedule of interclub and intercity tournaments during the golf season has been arranged between the golf clubs of Baker, Walla Walla, Boise, Pendleton, Lewiston and La Grande.

The first tournament in which La Grande will take part will be an interclub match with the Baker country club at Baker, Sunday, April 24. Baker has extended an invitation to all golf players of the city to attend the meet. It is reported that the Baker course is in good shape and a large number of players from here will probably make the trip.

The second interclub tournament, and the first one to be held at La Grande, will be August 14, when members of the Walla Walla country club will come here. September 5 and 6 Baker, Boise, La Grande, Pendleton and Walla Walla will take part in an intercity tournament at Baker, each club to enter a 12 man team.

There will be another interclub match between Walla Walla and La Grande at Walla Walla, September 11, and October 8 and 9 a second intercity tournament will be held at Walla Walla, with Baker, La Grande, Pendleton, Lewiston, and Walla Walla participating. Each club will furnish a 12 man team for this meet also.

Interclub matches with Baker and Pendleton to be held here will be arranged for later dates in the season.

This is the first time that a definite schedule of golf tournaments has been arranged here and plans are to carry out the same program year after year.

A big star and a little star who proved their worth in the last world series are proving again in the current campaign.

One is Big Babe Ruth, six feet two, and the other is Little Bill Sherdel five feet ten inches tall. Ruth has a lot to do with winning yesterday's game for the Yankees, while Sherdel is down in the losing pitcher for his team, the Cardinals. Yet both were playing the old ball game.

The big man usually is the more spectacular. Babe's bat started the slugging that beat the Athletics 6 to 3 by taking the confidence from

Pitcher Ehmke's arm with a howling homer in the opening frame. It was the Babe's first of the season and the thunderous uproar that went with it didn't help the condition of the luckless pitcher at all.

Out in Chicago Little Bill was playing baseball from the opposite end of the grove. Instead of receiving them with a bludgeon primarily, he was serving them up with all the cunning of nine years in the major leagues. In the entire game he granted two hits—one to one of these chances to be a homer by Hack Wilson and the other by the ball game, 1 to 0.

Joe Shaut, Cleveland southpaw, had the same kind of luck. Up to the seventh he allowed one hit, but when Phil, White Sox left fielder, slammed a homer and Shaut began to weaken. After that the Sox won, 6 to 1.

All three of those games virtually were won by home runs. Two good pitchers had a duel at Boston and Charlie Robertson, newcomer in the camp fire of the Braves came out of it a little better than his rival, McWeeney of Brooklyn. Robertson's hurling gave the Braves a 3 to 1 victory.

Baseball of the slugging kind was played by the unbeaten Pirates as they stayed on the roof of their league by letting down the Reds, 10 to 6.
