She was captured near Yunnanfu, capital of Yunnan province, while en route to Shanghai. In the vicinity of Shanghai from Anshunfu it is necessary to go south to reach the railway leading to the coast.

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 16 (AP)—Miss Mary I. Craig, a medical missionary of the inland China mission, reported captured by bandits in Yunnan province is an American citizen and her home is in Philadelphia. She is a sister of William B. Craig, managing editor of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin, who has not received any direct word from her.

Miss Craig, a daughter of the Third Presbyterian church, Philadelphia, went to China in 1913 after being graduated from the Presbyterian training school for Christian workers.

MODERATES THREATEN

SHANGHAI, Apr. 16 (AP)—The Cantonese extremists at Hankow must yield, or the moderates will launch a definite drive to oust the communists and establish the Cantonese capital at Nanking until China is unified.

This declaration was made today by General Pai Tzu-chi, Cantonese commander for the eastern area, in a formal statement to a conference of representatives of the vernacular press.

The question must be decided, he said, before continuing the military drive, northward, undertaken as a campaign on a large scale for establishment of the position among the powers to which China was entitled.

POULTRY TRADE SHOWS STRENGTH

Demand and Supply Both Devoid of Weakness in Portland Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 16 (AP)—Trade in poultry was specially active in today's early transactions on the local wholesale produce market. Receipts of light and heavy hens, broilers and fryers were fairly strong and demand active, especially for the latter at from 25 cents alive to 40 cents dressed. Orders for the fryers and broilers at from 28 to 32 cents were strong for Easter consumption. Light and heavy hens were bringing from 22 to 27 cents alive.

On the retail market, large hens at from 40 to 45 cents, mediums at from 35 to 40 cents, and broilers at from 50 to 60 cents per pound were going to consumers at steady demand. A few turkeys at from 45 to 55 cents and capons at from 45 to 48 cents were moved.

Butter and eggs maintain prices as per yesterday with demand fairly steady and eggs receipts large. Dressed hog and veal prices were unchanged in the day's early trading.

New prices for butter in prints and cartons announced by Portland creameries to take effect next Monday are set at 2 cents above the current price of standard grade cube butter which at present is 40 1/2 cents. This is in line with an arrangement made recently through a special committee of the dairy, local exchange, to keep print and carton butter automatically in balance with cube prices from day to day.

Starting Monday, local creameries have announced they will pay 42¢ per pound for butterfat, c. o. b. Portland.

Record Prices Attained Today In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Apr. 16 (AP)—Another demonstration of strength in high priced shares, a number of which surpassed previous record prices, and aggressive pool operations elsewhere stimulated by conservative business news over the holidays featured today's abbreviated session in the stock market.

Motors were absorbed on a large scale, when General Motors began to rise into new high ground and U. S. Steel duplicated its previous high record figures for all time. Leads were largely featureless, with exception of Atchafalaya which went to 13 1/2, a new peak. Remington Typewriter (old stock), soared to 139, a new high record. The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 1,100,000 shares.
