STATE TO TURN ON LEGAL GUNS

Offensive Thrusts in Trial of Dr. C. C. Dobbs Expected Today

SEATTLE, Apr. 18. (AP)—The main offense of the state in its case against C. C. Dobbs, Kirkland dentist accused of the murder of Leotta Whitehall, school girl patient, began in superior court here today, when the more important of the 100 witnesses summoned by the prosecution were scheduled to testify. New evidence was disclosed in a second analysis of the chemical contents of the body of the slain girl, the state indicated, but the details of the report of the chemist have been closely guarded. George H. Crandell, defense attorney, asserted the defense is also supplied with plenty of ammunition to meet the legal bombardment of the state. James L. and William P. Gerald, brothers of Coalfield, Wash., whose testimony at the inquest that they saw a man resembling Dr. Dobbs on a bridge near the swamp where the body was found, is regarded as the foundation of the prosecution's case, were scheduled to be the first witnesses to be placed on the stand today. The defense has indicated it will strongly attack the Gerald boys' story. Developments late Saturday indicated the defense also plans to attack the reliability of N. A. Baker, private detective employed by the state to aid in solving the slaying. Baker was expected to be recalled again today for more intensive grilling.

Telegram Employees Announce Plans

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 18. (AP)—The committee of the Portland Telegram employees which proposes formation of a corporation to take over the newspaper, today announced its plan of financing. It follows: First mortgage bonds, drawing 6 per cent interest per annum, of which \$200,000 are to be issued immediately, and of which \$200,000 are to remain in the treasury to be used for the purchase of new presses and machinery to take care of the future, increased growth of the newspaper, \$400,000. Debenture bonds, drawing 6 per cent interest, cumulative, to be immediately issued, \$200,000. Common stock, 60,000 shares, at \$10 each (to be issued when subscribed for and paid for in cash), \$600,000. Total capitalization to be authorized, \$1,200,000. First mortgage bonds to remain in treasury, \$200,000. Total capitalization to be issued, \$1,000,000, of which there will be reserved for working capital, \$250,000.

MORTGAGE OF M. E. CHURCH IS DESTROYED

(Continued from Page 1) A union church and Sunday school, the Methodists and the Episcopalians worshipped together in this building for a number of years, and in 1873 the Episcopalians built a church on Fourth street in Old Town and the Methodists continued to use the old union house as a meeting place until 1885, when the congregation took up quarters in the chapel of the Blue Mountain university and commenced planning for a new church home to be erected on Fourth street just opposite the present high school.

Build First Church By 1889 the congregation became a legal entity, being incorporated and dedicated its new church home at the head of the fourth street hill. From time to time this building was remodeled and enlarged, but in 1912 a new structure was found imperative and the present church home at Fourth and Spring was built and dedicated in December, 1913.

First sermon was preached in the Grande Ronde valley by the Rev. Lebon Case in Mr. Kennedy's tent in August, 1853 and the first pastor died 19 years later. From this date to 1883 the following ministers' names appear on the records, the Rev. Messrs. Elliot, Hines, Adams, Miller, Guilb and Grimes.
