

RAILROAD AGAIN IS SUIT TARGET

Receivership Sought for
C. R. of O.—Middle-
ton Files Action

UNION, Ore., Apr. 18.—Lawsuits appear to be coming thick and fast as a result of the recent sale and various transfers of the personal property of the Central Railroad of Oregon.

About two weeks ago, suit was brought by Carl Helm in the name of the state of Oregon, asking the appointment of a receiver for the Central Railroad of Oregon, with a view to winding up its affairs. This case will be heard by Judge Knowles on the presiding judge on the circuit bench.

This week Wednesday suit was brought in the circuit court by A. W. Middleton as trustee and director of the Central Railroad of Oregon, against R. L. Martin, Ray Woodbury, The Ray Woodbury company, the Grande Ronde Lumber company and Elmer Stoddard asking damages in the sum of approximately \$50,000 alleged to have been sustained by the Central Railroad of Oregon because of trespass upon the tracks of that company by the defendants in the removal of steel etc., on that portion of the Central Railroad between Union and Cove, Oregon. This case, should it come to trial, will be heard before a jury.

CHILD'S DISEASE RESISTANCE
INCREASED BY PROPER HOME
LIFE

For every illness there is a definite cause. As parents, have you ever considered that your attitude toward your children has anything to do with their health? Probably not, but it does have an important bearing.

Parents can be divided into several classes. Let's consider the normal. If there be such a one; or at least a class of parents who approach the normal.

By this I mean those who, first of all, are well physically and mentally, for the suggestiveness of ill health is very contagious and all children are great imitators. Physical and mental characteristics are transmitted and often the child is blamed for something for which the parents are indirectly responsible.

This is an unfair advantage which we have over children, for they certainly cannot select their parents. The normal parent should not expect too much from the child. It has taken us a great many years, much time and money and experience, to reach our present state of perfection. Unfortunately, too, the child is judged frequently according to our point of view after three years of achievement, and not from a corresponding period in our own development. The result is a constant series of "don'ts," while for the young child life is a constant urge to do.

The child of normal parents, who have worked out these considerations, has a tremendous physical advantage over its less fortunate playmates. There is normally a greater resistance to infections.

On the other hand, the children of parents who are of a nervous type are bound to inherit some of these unpleasant characteristics. If they are very intense, there is a constant strain upon their nervous system and consequently their

resistance is lowered. So parents are really a factor to be considered in the health of a child.

In the second place, the home and home life are a growing influence in the child's development. This is obvious when one thinks of those children brought up in tenements and of those in our own homes. Light and sunshine are essential for plant life, and they are equally so for human life.

The child is extremely susceptible to its environment and in its quite peaceful home life are stored up those elements which will be needed later in life.

It is safe, then, to conclude that inherited tendencies, the home life, and the environment of the child are important factors in creating or diminishing resistance to illnesses. An allied consideration, of course, is the supervision of the child. It must develop independence and it must look after itself at times. This it does, but not always wisely; so the wise guidance of parents again has a positive effect in maintaining health.

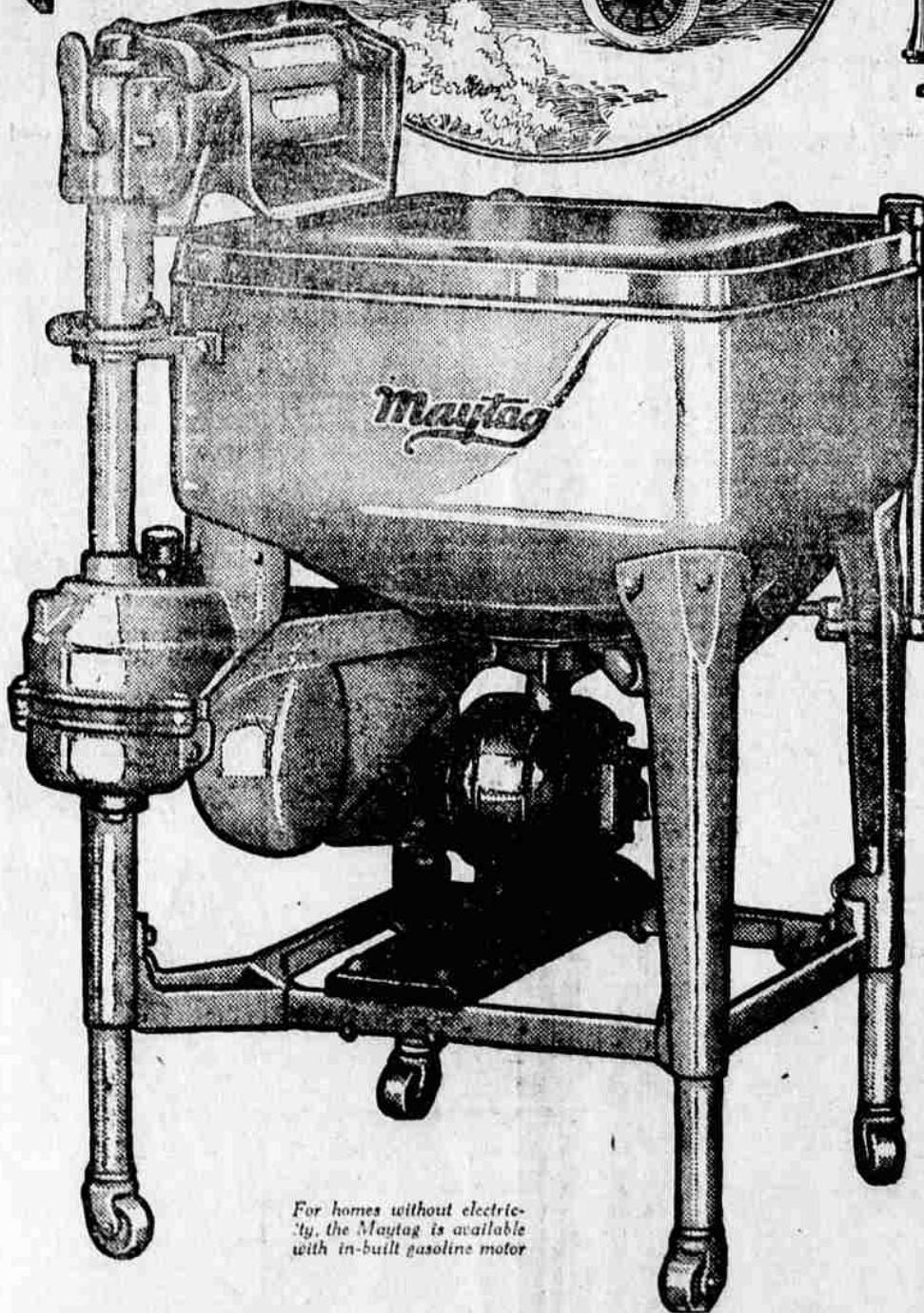
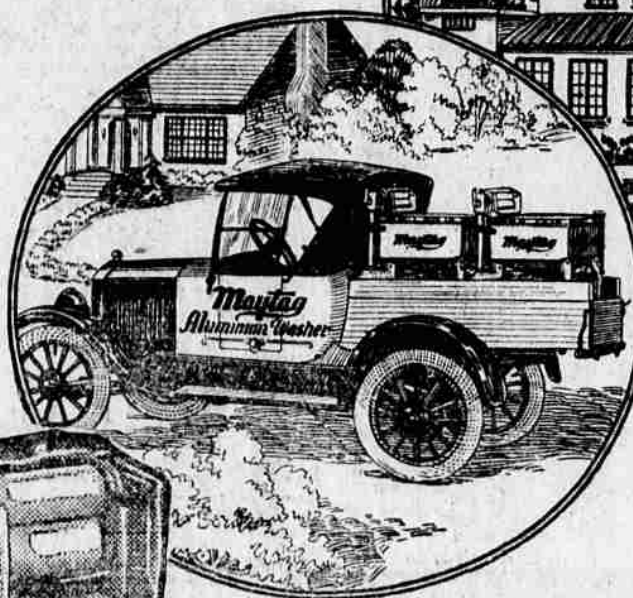
"BILL" HOHENZOLLERN JR., RECEIVES
