MARKET STEADY; FEW SPUDS LEFT

Fresh Supplies of Choice Country Dressed Meats Are Plentiful

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 18 (AP)—Fresh supplies of very choice country dressed meats were plentiful on the local wholesale street today, while post-Easter season demand of butchers was strong enough in the early trading to hold prices firm at current levels of 16 and 18 cents.

Dealers report a good Easter trade over the week end with stocks of eggs and prime poultry brought in for the holiday trade well cleaned up.

Butter and egg prices continue firm with no change on the daily exchange. Activity of California buyers on the local market is holding the market steady. Egg receipts continue strong with a thousand cases or more being stored daily.

Shipments of potatoes through the local market are reported about cleaned up. Shipments up to April 18 totalled 2411 cars, of which 159 went by boat. A canvass of the potato situation as of March 1 showed the estimated number of cars yet to be moved through the Columbia region as follows: Idaho, 5,500; Washington, 2,275 and Oregon 375.

Since potato prices have not climbed so high as usual toward the end of the old crop business, values are not expected to decline rapidly.

CHICAGO, Apr. 18 (AP)—Opening at 1/4 to 1/2 advance, wheat soon went higher. Corn, oats and provisions were also firmer, corn starting unchanged to 1/4 up, and later scoring gains all around.

Wheat closed firm, 1/4 to 1/2 up; corn at a shade to 1/2 up; oats and provisions 1/2 to 1/4 down.

Sentiment Same After Holiday; Trade Bullish

NEW YORK, Apr. 18 (AP)—Resumption of trading after the Easter holiday disclosed no change in stock market sentiment, which was predominantly bullish.

With the industrial average at record high levels, after a sustained advance of several days, heavy profit-taking was inevitable in that group, but offerings were readily absorbed, and more than a score of industrials moved into record high levels.

Speculations for the advance also showed a tendency to switch from the industrial to the rail when the former showed signs of halting, North Island and Texas and Pacific coast jumping several points to record high levels.

General Motors crossed 135 to a new high, coincident with the announcement of a new truck, and Dupont sold above 250 for the first time. Remington Typewriter softened 3 points to 128, and new peak prices since 1925, or longer, were recorded by American Sugar Refining, International Business Machines, Detroit Edison, Montana Power, Green Canam Copper Air Reduction, United Drug, Olin Electric, Inland Steel and several others.

The closing was irregular. Renewed selling of the oil and dropping out of soft spots in other groups to the edge of the advance in the final hour. General Motors reacted to around Saturday's close and Chrysler, American Can, Corn Products, Freeport Texas and Fox Film were quite heavy. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.
