FOUR NEW HOMES WILL BE ERECTED

New Construction Authorized During Past Week \$14,600

Permits issued last week called for new construction and for alterations and repairs to older buildings totaling \$14,600. Four new residence buildings, one to cost \$500, were authorized.

The new homes to be built will be on H. between Third and Fourth, on Fourth between L. and M., on Spring between Fourth and Fifth, and on East N. between Cherry and Willow.

Permits issued from Apr. 11 to Apr. 16, inclusive, follow:

Apr. 11—L. W. Cooper, to erect a home on H. between Third and Fourth, to cost \$300.

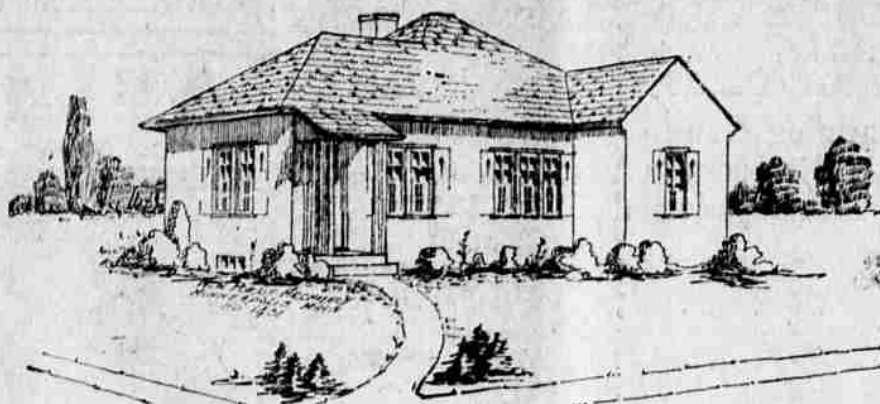

AN ATTRACTIVE BUNGALOW



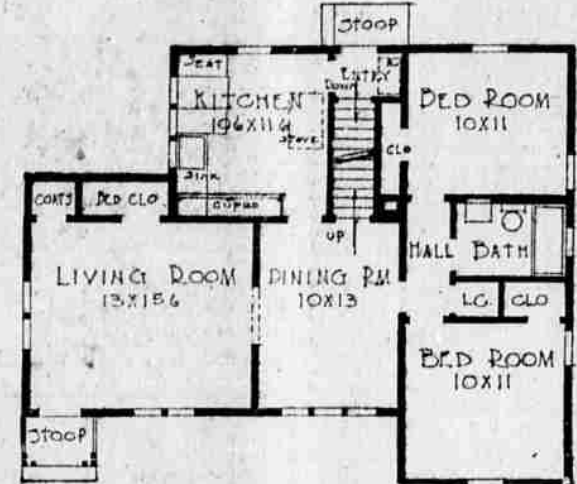

With its white cement plastered walls green trim and shutters, variegated shingle roof, this little home is very attractive.

Entrance is direct into the living room, off which is an extra large closet to be used for a disappearing bed in case of an emergency, there by giving equivalent of three bedrooms. A steep stair leads over the basement stair to an unfinished attic, where there is a good amount of storage space.

The rooms are all fair size, with a minimum of waste space. The basement contains furnace, room, fruit and vegetable room as well as a large laundry and dry-room.

The cost of this attractive bungalow is placed at \$5,000 to \$6,000 exclusive of heating and plumbing; in order to do this, however, it is necessary to finish the interior in fir, stained for the main portion, and pine painted in the balance, with oak or birch floors. The walls are finished in the smooth potted coat as to paper later, after all settling has taken place, in the meantime, however, they have been tinted a cream in the living and dining room, and pink and yellow in the bedrooms. The location of the chimney, makes a very satisfactory layout for a warm air furnace.

THE BLUE AND PINK BORDER

Blue and pink is a favorite combination and a narrow border three or four feet in width which is usually available in even the smallest places, may be filled with annuals in those shades to the great delight of the owner and the beautification of the premises. There is ample material in any seed list for such a harmonious combination.

For the back of the border where tall subjects are wanted there are pink cosmos tall pink snapdragons and a neglected but deserving annual, a relative of the hollyhock, the lavatera, a handsome rose pink. With these the blue cornflower and the double annual larkspur make beautiful companion groups. All will grow from two to three feet high with reasonably good soil and cultivation, the cosmos in some of its forms reaching six feet.

A clump of pink sweet peas might be placed here and there for cutting with their blooming season in out short by hot weather, when annuals in pink shades or some of the new blue tones or a

WALLOWA GRAIN OUTLOOK GOOD

Although Held Back by Weather, Wheat Shows a Strong Stand

WALLOWA, Ore., Apr. 19. (Special)—Winter wheat prospects in this county are very good, according to farmers. The grain has grown but little this spring, due to the cold weather, although most of the fields present an excellent stand. Some farmers express the opinion that the wheat is much better even though small, as the chances of it becoming far enough along for it to be badly damaged by a hard freeze in the last of May and early June are greatly lessened.

Reports indicate that about a usual acreage will be seeded to spring wheat this year, both on the irrigated and dry farms and

The lobelia and pansies offer abundant blue also. The Virginia stocks give a fine sheet of pink with the new annual gypsophila to make a handsome edging.

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on the latter summerfallow which was not seeded last fall will be sown to spring wheat. The demand for seed has been good and the price per bushel has been around \$1.20, cleaned and ready to sow.

Pig Crop Poor

The chances for much of an increase in the number of spring pigs produced by farmers of this county this season does not appear probable at this time, a number of farmers from various communities reporting very poor luck with the pig crop. Cussins Bros., of the Loring section, state they have lost 63 young pigs during the past few weeks, while many others report their sows having only a few from very large litters. In many instances the pigs appear to be small and weak.

Some small bands of stock are being moved to summer range at this time, where stockmen state the grass is beginning to get a fairly good start. The most of the stock have come through the winter in fairly good condition, despite the late spring and shortage of feed.
