NEW SPUD PRICE IS COMING DOWN

Supplies Increasing in the Portland Market—Eggs, Butter About Same

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 20 (AP).—Early trading on the local produce market was at generally steady prices with a moderate increase in the price of potatoes. The price of eggs and butter was about the same.

Potatoes were unchanged today with trading steady, while in the butter division a small advance in extra and prime grades to 4 1/2 and 4 3/4 cents, respectively, are the only changes. Eggs received continue strong.

With supplies of new potatoes on the increase, prices are lower. As against a 10-cent price level which has predominated the past two weeks, local potatoes are now offered for from 6 to 8 cents per pound.

Eggs received at 17.15 to 17.25, a 10-pound lot; local butter 17.15 to 17.25, a 10-pound lot.

Asparagus available are heavy with Columbia taking stock at 15 to 22.50 per dozen one-pound bunches.

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—A number of the directors and others interested in the Leap school district were busy the latter part of the week constructing a new fence around the school grounds.

A. A. Hunter was in the Goshute ranch, east of here, the last of the week getting a bunch of cattle he purchased. The demand for stock cattle appears to be very good here this spring, with ordinary cows selling at around \$25 each and good yearlings for \$35 each.

Dee Gustin has been plowing. He is one of the first farmers in the hill sections to start farming operations.

Several families of children of the Leap school, including those of the Frank Walker, John Cough, and L. V. Lathrop families, have been quite sick several days the past week of the "flu". They are reported considerably improved at this time.

George Coughlin and Lee Gustin were delivering a bunch of fat hogs to J. L. Starnell here the last of the week.

Misses Artie and Edith Coughlin, who are attending school here, spent the week end at their home at Leap. The grass is beginning to get large enough to make fairly good feed in many of the pastures in this part of the county.

The latest of spring has made the local supply of all farm products limited and in some instances farmers say they will have to buy some hay to feed during spring work.

With the roads through the hill sections east of here getting dry and in good shape the greater part of the distance along the road route. Kinley Smithwick, carrier, has put his car into use, in place of a horse and buggy.
