COAST MEET TO BE JUNE 3 AND 4

Sixteen Teams Already Entered with 9 More Likely to Compete

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Apr. 21.—Sixteen institutions have already entered teams in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate track and field championships to be staged in the Los Angeles coliseum June 3 and 4. These will enter an aggregate of about 250 athletes.

Teams which have been entered with the manager of the championships are: California, Stanford, Montana, Washington State, Oregon, Oregon Agricultural College, Tulane, College of Idaho, University of Pennsylvania, San Jose State, Cal. Tech, Whittier, College of Pacific, Utah Aggie and University of California at Los Angeles.
