

Boys And Girls Of 4-H Clubs To Have Club Camp

WASHINGTON, Apr. 22. (AP)—One of the unique meetings to be held in the national capital will be the camp of the First National Farm Boys and Girls 4-H Club camp.

There are now more than 40,000 local 4-H clubs in the country, with nearly 1,000,000 members. Their symbol is the four leaf clover, the four H's stand for "Head, Heart, Hands and Health."

The camp will be pitched on the Mall, near the bureau of plant industry, and in addition to the various camp activities, arrangements have been made for many educational tours for the farm boys and girls who will be lucky enough to attend.

Two boys and two girls will be selected by each state to represent its 4-H clubs. These will be accompanied by two state club leaders, a man and woman from each state, and all will be chosen for their exceptional work in connection with farm stock, home economics and leadership activities.

Conferences will be held for the leaders and club members in the auditorium of the National Museum and many of the old timers in the agricultural extension movement will be present for "Pioneers Day," on June 20.

A motto of the Federal Co-operative Extension Service, one of whose functions is to carry on club work among the younger farm folk with state agricultural colleges, is: "There are about 11,000,000 rural boys and girls in the United States between the ages of 10 and 18. About one out of twenty is in a 4-H club. Let's get the other 19."

Mass Fights With Bare Knuckles Brighten Dull Days For Soviets

MOSCOW, Apr. 22 (AP)—Boxing as practiced in the United States is hardly known to Russians. But the working classes, especially the Semizhnik (carriage drivers) indulge in fierce fist fights that often result fatally. These fist fights are a heritage of the fifteenth century, and like American boxing, are intended to demonstrate the physical prowess of the participants.

The heroes of these encounters frequently are mentioned in song and prose by Russia's greatest writers. Up to the time of Peter the Great, many of them were honored by the Czar with gifts and high positions. Unlike American pugilist matches, however, Russian fist fights are on a "free-for-all" basis. One large group of fighters opposes another group. The winning side is determined by the number of "victims" left on the "battle field." The participants are free to batter their opponents without mercy, the only restriction being that no one shall strike the adversary while down. To carry small pieces of iron in order to make one's fists more formidable is considered as disqualification.

The battles are invariably held on the banks of frozen rivers, and the participants, many of whom are where from ten to a thousand. Many years ago the ice on the Moscow river broke under 2,000 fighters and 40 were drowned. Although long since forbidden by the police, one of these fist battles, of a particularly violent character, took place this winter on the frozen Moscow river. In the presence of 2,000 persons, who lined the banks, more than 100 pounds of all ages attacked one another for two hours. Many spectators, thirsting for excitement, joined the battle.

Heads, limbs and knuckles were broken, and twelve of the defeated Semizhniks were removed unconscious to a hospital. The timely arrival of the police prevented the affair from becoming more disastrous.
