A wireless message from Hankow says that military preparations are under way on the outskirts of the city, ostensibly in anticipation of an attack by General Chiang Kai-Shek, leader of the moderate section of the Kuomintang (Cantonese political party) who recently established a government at Nanking for the announced purpose of combating the communist influence. There are about 896 foreigners in Hankow including 68 Americans. Because of the tension in the city they spend the nights at the water front, almost under the guns of 45 foreign warships. American sailors and marines assigned to the task of searching Chinese entering Shanghai by way of the bund are finding many of them wearing uniforms under their clothes. These are turned over to the police who seek to determine whether they are merely seeking refuge from the Chinese sections or spies joining the red labor ranks. Most of the Chinese are taking the search good naturedly.

FOREST WEEK IS OBSERVED HERE
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The purpose of the week is to urge the protection of the national forests and to guard against forest fires.
Plan Improvements
The Unatilla national forest, consisting of 1,344,770 acres, and including most of the Blue Mountains range, is planning various improvements during this year to assist in the conservation of the forests and prevent forest fires.
There will be 320 miles of roads repaired and maintained during the summer, 325 miles of trails cleared and placed in first class condition and 550 miles of telephone lines repaired.
The telephone system, which connects all of the forest lookouts, firemen and rangers, is the most important part of the system in regard to fire control. Next in importance is the roads over which supplies and men may be sent to the fire and next are the trails, which open rough and inaccessible country for fire protection and administrative purposes.
This summer 25 miles of roads, 30 miles of trails, 25 miles of telephone lines and one lookout tower, 60 feet in height, will be built. With the completion of the 25 miles of telephone line and the installation of the central dispatcher at Kamela the telephone system of the forest will be practically completed.
Several new lookout towers are needed and will be built as soon as funds are available. The forest also needs more roads and trails which will be built each year as money is available.
