

OFFICERS ACCUSE DOROTHY, DOCTOR

Actress and Physician Face Felony Charges on Raymond's Death

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 26 (AP).—An alleged plot to conceal the true facts surrounding the death of Ray Raymond, musical comedy star, today had been laid to his widow, Dorothy Mackaye, stage actress, and Dr. William J. Sullivan, Hollywood physician, who attended the actor before he died, as the pair awaited arraignment on grand jury indictments.

The actress and Dr. Sullivan were indicted on two felony counts yesterday as a result of a second grand jury investigation into Raymond's death. The first inquiry resulted last week in a murder indictment against Paul Kelly, seven juvenile, who admitted having engaged Raymond in a fist fight in a quarrel over the comedian's wife.

Miss Mackaye and Dr. Sullivan are specifically charged with being accessories, after the fact and with compounding a felony. The charges are based on evidence tending to show that Dr. Sullivan concealed knowledge of the fatal fight after being paid \$500 by Miss Mackaye, who is alleged to have received the money from Kelly for "expenses."

Arrested Last Night
The warrant for her arrest was

served on Miss Mackaye last night at her home where the actress was reported prostrated from nervous exhaustion. By arrangement with the authorities she was allowed to furnish \$5,000 bail and thus escaped going to jail.

Dr. Sullivan, who appeared before the grand jury before the issuing of the indictments, telephoned the sheriff's office last night to say that he would surrender himself today.

Associated Press Elects Directors

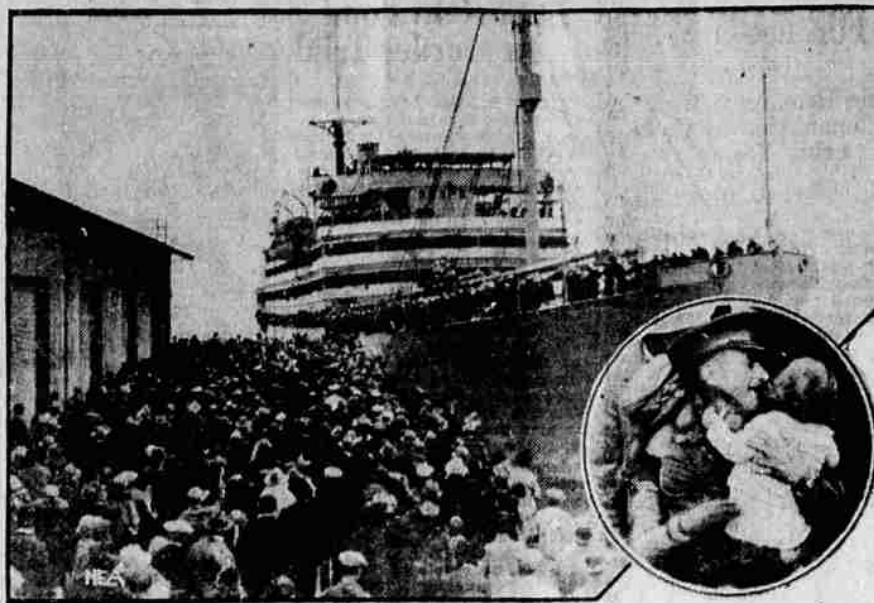

The members passed a resolution of sympathy for the flood sufferers in the Mississippi valley, after which the meeting adjourned.

STOMACHACHE

Many people think a pain that occurs in the abdominal cavity is in the stomach, but there are lots of organs in the abdominal cavity that may produce pain other than the stomach.

The stomach is simply the alarm box of the abdominal cavity and bears the same relationship to the other organs contained therein as an alarm box does to the fire department. When the stomach becomes upset, regardless of cause of the trouble, people are prone to treat it as the primary cause of the upset instead of looking for the real trouble.

If you should see a building burning, rush to a fire alarm box, break the glass, turn the key, and in a few minutes see the hose truck of the fire department arrive, up and turn the water on the alarm box, you think the firemen had lost their minds. Yet it would not be any more foolish for the firemen to commit such an act than it is to treat a sick stomach because some other organ in the abdominal cavity is diseased.

Let us take appendicitis for example. When the appendix becomes acutely inflamed the first thing the patient experiences is colic. The pain associated with this type of colic usually is diffuse in nature, that is, all over the stomach and bowel. Immediately following this pain the stomach be-

comes sick, nauseated. Vomiting may even be experienced and in fact often is, especially in severe cases.

Following the sick stomach there is a little fever, usually ninety-nine to one hundred degrees Fahrenheit, and the pulse rate is slightly increased, possibly ten or fifteen beats. If the fever and the pulse run higher complications may be expected. Usually it is not until the next day that pain and tenderness are found over the appendix.

These symptoms of course are only associated with acute appendicitis, and there are other forms of appendicitis that give a picture quite different from this one. But the idea I wish to impart to you is that stomachache or acute abdominal pain is not always a simple matter, and when it occurs one should immediately call the family physician.

Should one neglect attending to a case of acute appendicitis gangrene of the appendix may occur. This is usually followed by a rupture of the organ with a spilling of its contents into the abdominal cavity. Millions of germs are to be found in these contents and the walls of a diseased appendix.

While the disease is localized in the appendix these germs are restrained from doing a great deal of damage, but when rupture occurs they run riot. Inflammation of the bowel, or peritonitis, as we know it, immediately starts to develop, and this is a condition fraught with the greatest of danger. Appendicitis is a surgical disease. There is no known medical remedy or dietary regime that will cure it. As soon as a diagnosis of this condition is made, the patient should be operated upon. Recovery without operation is rare.
