INVITES SACASA TO CONFERENCE

Coolidge's Envoy to Nicaragua Hopes to End War in Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Apr. 27. (AP)—Henry L. Stimson, who came to Nicaragua as personal representative of President Coolidge, has invited Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, president of the liberal government at Puerto Cabezas to meet him as soon as possible in Managua to discuss the situation. He told the president that a destroyer would be placed at his disposal and that safe conduct would be provided for him and his entourage.

Dr. Sacasa has not yet replied to this invitation, but in a message to liberal leaders here he accented a previous proposal to send delegates, saying he would delegate members of his cabinet.

Ground Work Done
Although Mr. Stimson consistently refuses to make public the conditions he has gathered thus far, it is declared on excellent authority that the ground work for the talk after the liberal chiefs had exchanged messages with Dr. Sacasa, notifying him of a peace plan, the gist of which is:

- First, Adolfo Diaz, the conservative president, to remain president until Dec. 31, 1928.
- Second, general disarmament by both liberals and conservatives.
- Third, establishment of a Nicaraguan constabulary of 2500 men commanded by American officers to preserve order.
- Fourth, American forces remain in Nicaragua in limited numbers indefinitely.
- Fifth, liberals guaranteed participation in the present conservative government and the courts.
- Sixth, free elections in 1928, to be guaranteed by the United States if both sides request it.
- Seventh, confiscated property to be restored to its rightful owners and damage claims to be adjusted.

Kept Alive Due To Work of Friends

ROANOKE, Va., Apr. 27. (AP).—Complete exhaustion and traces of hypostatic pneumonia, today kept alive the once sturdy body of Walter L. Booth, former youth, as he approached the 140th hour in his friends' attempt to keep him alive by artificial respiration. The dramatic struggle against physicians' prediction of death goes on unceasingly, however, with alternating pairs of companions swinging the lad's arms up and down, forcing breath into the tired lungs. Booth was stricken Thursday as he was preparing for an operation for a dislocated vertebra.

GOLD STRIKE MADE

SPOKANE, Wash., Apr. 27. (AP).—What was reported yesterday as a new Eldorado in the vicinity of Republic, in Stevens county, Wash., had faded today to a story of a promising gold strike by a prospector and the subsequent filing of two claims by his associates. Most of the rest of the land in that locality, it was declared today, is farming territory and not subject to mineral entry.

PLANE SAVES MAROONED MEN ON PIKE'S PEAK



These two pictures tell the story of how two lives were saved when aviators, flying over the summit of Pike's Peak, Colorado, dropped a food supply to two men cut off from the outside world by snowstorms. PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 27. (AP).—Highway men and burglars were out again last night, several persons reporting losses in holdups and home prowling.

Two hundred dollars was taken from Earl Donovan by two young holdup men at the corner of River and Albina avenues. Donovan said the robbers carried automatic pistols.

Mrs. Rose Erick escaped being held up by dodging into her home at 84 North Twenty-First street, when a short, dark, stocky man leveled a gun at her.

Margaret Marshall, 6534 Ninety-Fifth avenue, southeast, was awakened by a noise about 2 o'clock this morning to see a burglar climbing out her window. A fountain pen, beads, watch and brooch were missing.

Driving past Sixteenth and Lovejoy streets, Patrolman Langley saw two men sitting on a trunk. He stopped to question them and they bolted.
