New and Original Ideas Agreed upon for Festival, June 13-18

Entirely new and original ideas in stage construction and operation are being worked out in the building of the mammoth stage for the production of *Rosario*, a national feature of the annual Rose Festival in Portland June 13 to 18. There will be 3,000 actors, singers and dancers in the cast.

The stage will be the largest ever erected in the west, and will be equipped with the largest and greatest assortment of scenery assembled for a Western production either indoors or in the open air.

Because of the size of the sets required in keeping with the unusually large proportions on which the entire production is worked out, the shifting of scenes with a minimum of delay and confusion presented a problem that has been solved by the perfection of a scheme of construction and mechanical equipment that will lift the heavy sets by counterweight action, through the floor of the stage. It will be possible to place the "drops", each 112 feet long and 14 feet high, smoothly and noiselessly in 15 seconds, with a minimum of stage help that will be out of sight at all times.

Five Stage Changes

There will be five complete changes in the action of *Rosario*, the finale ballet being staged against a background of Mount Hood, 60 feet high.

The open air theater stage will include an apron for the dance numbers, 182 feet long and 40 feet across, and the first stage level will be 30 feet wide and 40 feet deep. One hundred and sixty thousand feet of lumber will be used in construction of the stage. Four thousand yards of burlap and two tons of paint has been ordered for manufacture of the scenery. One hundred 1,000-watt lamps will be used as footlights, and 1,200 relay time frames will be used for color effects.

Remembers When Eggs Sold at Four Cents a Dozen; Wages \$6.75 a Month

WASHINGTON, Apr. 28 (AP)—Who remembers the day when a farmer could make a box of matches last a year, but could get only 4 cents a dozen for eggs? Government statisticians have run across these as well as a host of other interesting figures for inclusion in the first comprehensive history of farm prices in the United States.

Letters from old-timers on the farm today who remember what their fathers and grandfathers got and paid for this and that article, accounts books of hundreds of country general stores showing how produce was exchanged for goods, and general merchandise, tobacco, stationery, and a variety of other goods, are being used in the unique undertaking.

Its purpose, one official explained, is to provide basic material for various economic studies. "Everyone is trying to forecast the future," he said. "The industries are trying to forecast the future."

Seymour Jones To Attend May 28 Grange Meet

Seymour Jones, state market master, is to attend the Union County Grange conference as the leading speaker. Mr. Jones was formerly speaker of the house, and has been an active granger for some 20 years. He was the chairman of the committee that drafted the grange income tax bill for the last election.

The grange conference will be held at Blue Mountain grange hall on May 28 and will be an all-day meeting. A number of papers and addresses have been arranged for along the lines of grange work and also on general farm topics. The meeting will be open to the public.

Higher than they are today. In a letter typical of many others received a Salem, Va., farmer wrote that 75 years ago his father bought 150 acres of land for \$2,500 and "everybody thought he was crazy for paying so much."

Two years ago, he said, the land would have brought \$15,000. Farm lands got from 25 to 50 cents a day for working from daylight to dark, or from \$4.75 to \$12.50 a month. Farm wages without board on April 1, 1927, were \$48.47 a month.

While the father sold many thousands of eggs at 6 cents a dozen and large extra fine frying chickens at from 10 to 15 cents apiece, the son had paid as high as 30 cents for eggs and \$1.50 for chickens "no better."

Other Prices
Dressed hogs sold for \$2.50 to \$4.50 a hundred pounds; shoes were made by hand for 50 cents a pair, and 30 bushels of "best Irish potatoes" netted the grower, clear of freight, drayage and commissions, only \$8.10, or slightly more than 10 cents a bushel.

In 1799 a country store operator sold 21 items to one man over a period of three months. Twenty-seven were rum, 45 gallons being bought for 15 cents a gallon.

Other Items:
1834—A 74-year-old slave sold for \$1; a two-year-old boy brought \$50, and a nine-year-old girl \$1,000.

1847—Butter sold for 5 cents a pound; eggs 4 cents a dozen. Fifty-three years later butter rose to 9 cents.

1851—Potatoes 20 cents a bushel. They averaged a dollar in 1925.

1842—One hundred and twenty-four pounds of "beef with neck" sold for 2 cents a pound.

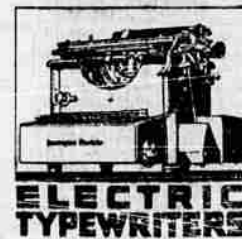
1894—Wheat 47 cents a bushel. It is now around \$1.25.

1822—Half gallon of whiskey 25 cents. Comparative figures are not available.
