It is, however, this wonderful reserve in the kidney substance, quantitatively, that allows us to weather so many acute storms. Every acute illness takes its percentage of toll from these organs. Overeating and overdrinking likewise do the same by causing the kidneys to overwork. Poisons take their toll in the same manner.

The commonest forms of kidney diseases of the degenerative and infectious conditions which come from acute infections elsewhere in the body, the most frequent causes being infected tonsils and teeth, although infections elsewhere can act in the same way.

How do infected tonsils and teeth infect the kidney? Easy. Chronic infections of the tonsils are common things. A great deal of the infection is squeezed out in the throat and expectorated or swallowed in talking, chewing, etc., but a great deal of it is absorbed by the blood and carried through the system.

If the infection is severe enough it may affect a joint. Then it is called rheumatism. It may affect the heart, causing myocarditis and endocarditis, but as it is almost always eliminated by the great filters—the kidneys—it is almost sure to infect them eventually.

Sharp Contrast In Ken's Latest At The Star

From the frenzied shouts of "Tide 'em Cowboy!" to the soft romantic strumming on guitars of "La Paloma," from a scene crammed full of action at a Western rodeo to the winning of a maiden under moonlit Mexican skies—these are some of the contrasts "Somewhere in Sonora," which opened a three day run at the Star theater today.

They are but few of the contrasts. The new First National feature starring Ken Maynard offers many. It offers opportunities for contrast with the "average 'western," which explains why "Somewhere in Sonora" is in a class all by itself. For it is superior. The usual methods of injecting thrills are avoided. Maynard's sensational ability to do almost the impossible in riding stunts takes care of this end.
