The New York Giants bats again played the marching music for the National league parade today after a wild scramble for choice places in the line.

With a flurry of extra base blows they subdued the Braves in a slug-fest ending by 4-3. At the same time the Quakers and Cardinals moved up into second place, while there was a general shake up in the American league which affected no less than five teams.

Pittsburgh's tumble from a seat on the peak was no light fall. The Pirates went down hard in a cloud of dust before a blast of 17 Chicago hits. The contest ended fruitfully in a top-sided count of 16-4.

Homer Wins Game
The rebellious Philles were scarcely less vigorous in their treatment of four Brooklyn pitchers, but it required a home run in the ninth by Wrightstone to clinch the game 8 to 4. Wrightstone's home arrived while the bases were jammed.

The only skirmish in the league unmarked by a parade of pitchers from slab to showers produced a 2-1 victory for the Cardinals over the Reds.

Many Changes
Second, third, fourth, sixth and seventh places in the American all held new tenants today. An eleven-inning defeat of the Braves by the White Sox ended the Athletics to sliding into second place on the crest of another huge hitting wave. The Senators were dropped from third to fourth while Detroit pushed the Indians off the sixth shelf.

Six Washington hurlers ran to cover under the Mackmen storm of hits. The Athletics winning easily 15-7.

Pitching duels dominated the Cleveland-Detroit and St. Louis-Chicago battles, with Sox clinching their game in the eleventh 2-1, and the Tigers staging a five-run seventh inning spurt to beat off the Indians at 6-5.

WHISTLERS WINNING BOUT WITH DISEASE
KANSAS CITY — An unusual bout with the dreaded Asiatic disease, trachoma, has been staged by many of the best known whistlers in the country. In the past half dozen years, it has been disclosed here by Ed (Strangler) Lewis, champion of the world's heavy weight wrestling championship.

Lewis announced he had won a doctor's decision after a five year struggle with the ailment. Two surgeons doctors all but despaired of restoring his sight, he said.

"The wrestling game in America has been haunted by the specter of trachoma for years," Lewis said. "A Hindu wrestler made an American tour and left in his wake a dozen cases, some of which have since led to serious consequences."

ENGLAND HAS OWN BASEBALL LEAGUE
CLIPPING NORTON, Eng. — This is the only district in England where a baseball league is maintained from year to year. Cricket is the national game in other parts.

Baseball is also played in Wales, but it is not the same game that is played in America, and the Clipping Norton district is the only place in England where American rules are observed.

A team from the Clipping Norton district was the first to beat an all American one, and last season the town club won the championship of England.

Today 3,000 athletes from 255 universities, colleges and high schools throughout the nation begin two days of competition in the eighteenth annual of the event, and Griffith, now athletic commissioner of the Western Conference, will be on hand, as he has been every year since the war.

The Drake event and the Penn games held in recent years on the same dates, both attract national representation and mark the peak of the track season each year. The schools have vied with approximately equal results in star performances.
