TIGERS WITHOUT 440 STAR TODAY

Smutz Injured and Unable to Complete—Mile Expected to Be Hard

La Grande's team entered the Union county track and field meet at the Union stock show grounds this afternoon with one of its star performers unable to participate. Smutz, sprinter and 440-yard star, was injured a day or two ago when he was spiked. It is believed, however, that his injuries will be healed before the Eastern Oregon meet at Baker next Saturday.

Mays, Union quarter miler, is favored to win this event with Smutz out unless Newton can run the 440 in less than 54 seconds. Mays showed his heels to all Eastern Oregon athletes last year excepting Smutz, and is expected to make a bid for quarter mile honors this season.

Talon's team this year is without the mighty Fugit, who has accounted for many points in the shot and discus events during the last two years in both the East Oregon and the county meets.

Richens, Union's miler, is out to break the record this year and has been training consistently for many months. He will have a formidable rival, however, in Anson, who has developed into a crack distance man—capable of running the mile in about 5:45, possibly less if pressed. Anson also runs close to Davis in the half mile.

La Grande, in addition to sending its strong track team to Union today, sent a large delegation of fans, who are figuring the Tigers will win by a margin of around 40 points.

Missouri Athlete Decathlon Winner

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—The intercollegiate all-around athletic laureate that have rested for the past two years on the broad shoulders of Tony Planisky of Georgetown, passed Friday to a new star in versatility, Vernon Kennedy of the Central Missouri State Teachers college.

Blapaky, now out of college competition, was not there to defend his honors, but Kennedy shattered the Georgetown star's intercollegiate record in defeating nine rivals for the decathlon championship which provided an all-day side show for the Pennsylvania relay carnival at Franklin field.

The sturdy Missourian finished the grueling 10-event test, lasting over eight hours, with a score of 7326.5175 points, eclipsing the mark of 7129.18 set by Planisky last year. It was one of the keenest battles ever staged for all-around honors, with Kennedy coming from behind to beat out Dick Stridger of DePauw university, who led for seven events and finished second, less than 100 points behind Kennedy. Virgil Elliott, the versatile paragon from Bethany college, West Virginia, weakened after a flying start and finished third, with Vincent Moraney of Georgetown fourth.

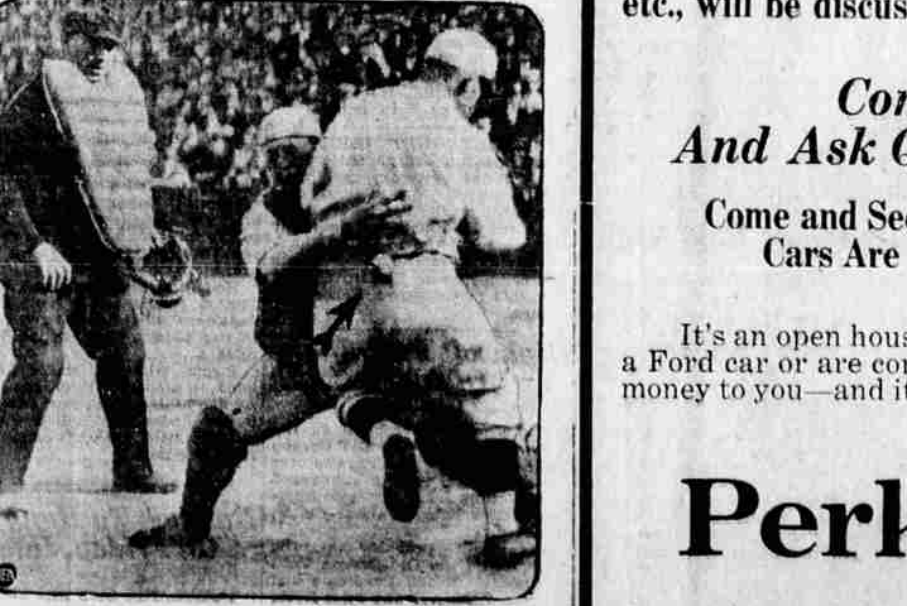
