ALBANY COLLEGE OPENS CAMPAIGN

Educational Workers in East Oregon—Speak in Wallawa County

An educational campaign is being conducted by the Self-Help college of Albany to attain the desired quota of \$400,000 as required by the United States commission to keep the schools standardized. C. W. Green, president of the college, who spoke in Baker yesterday, has a school in liberal art and sciences of which he is very proud. There are 117 students enrolled in the art and sciences as well as the same number in music.

The Albany Self-Help college ranks second in the state of Oregon and is accepted by all educational systems in all parts of the country. It is said, "The main objective of the school is to offer to all 'deserving young men and women who have high mental powers and noble ideals an opportunity to develop their resources in order that our country be given the benefit of such leadership.'"

Mr. Kerr was once called to the Presbyterian ministry here and has many friends and pleasant memories in La Grande. He expressed his delight that La Grande is to have a normal.

The college offers courses in any profession that one would desire. Among the prominent graduates of the Self-Help college are Dr. Hunter, a leading pathologist in government research; Miss Ethel Redfield, superintendent of schools in Idaho; and the Rev. Fred Neill, an Oregon boy who is accredited to having the largest Presbyterian Church of the World in Africa. He has 7,000 African Christians.

The school comprises a 45-acre campus. The main administrative building cost \$20,000. A large dormitory for boys has been built and a dormitory for girls is contemplated for the fall.

A \$50 scholarship is offered to each of the three highest students graduating from high schools during this campaign.

Mr. Green and Mr. Kennedy are leaving for Caldwell, Idaho in a few days where they will make preparations for sponsoring a similar campaign for colleges in Idaho. Their next campaign stop will be in Nashville, Tennessee.

Reel Received Here—A motion picture reel entitled "Crops and Kilowatts," of irrigation and water power in connection with the conservation of forests, was received by Gerald Tucker, forest ranger, this morning and is being shown at the Arcade theater today and will be shown at the Star tomorrow. 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Pygmies, Gorillas Photographed in Film at Sherrys

Ben Burbridge's "The Gorilla Hunt," now showing at Sherrys theater, is well worth seeing. It is a travelogue of the interior of Africa and like the recent Alaskan pictures which were shown at another movie house in La Grande some time ago, gives almost unbelievable facts of far-off islands. The party's progress on the Congo river, skirted by unexplored jungles, into the land of cannibals, pygmies, gorillas and big game of all sorts given one first hand knowledge of the dark continent. Some of the country explored has never been photographed before.

The pictures of the giant Kivu gorillas and of a huge tusker are of extraordinary interest and the scenes of native life in the uncivilized portions of Africa are, to say the least, enlightening.

room where he took his seat beside his mother Mrs. Belle De Autremont, on one side and his attorneys, Fred E. Smith and David E. Evans, of Eugene, John Collier, of Portland, and Gus Nowbury, of Medford, on the other. As usual he appeared composed, but was slightly pale and when the calling of the jurors started, nervously picked at one sleeve.

Mrs. Little McKee, of the Applegate valley, was the first juror examined by United States District Attorney George A. Neuner, for the state. Mr. Neuner confined his questioning to the juror's views of the death penalty and circum-

stances, and to her reply that she was opposed to the death penalty in certain cases but believed that circumstantial evidence could remove that opposition. Mrs. McKee was turned over to John A. Collier, for the defense, who passed the juror after lengthy questioning, particularly as to whether she had any friends or relatives in the employ of the Southern Pacific railroad.

De Autremont Seems Nervous—During this questioning the defendant kept his eyes on the floor and constantly wiped his hand with a rubber band, now and then saying a word to his mother, who sat with the fur collar of her coat buttoned tightly about her chin.

After further question by Neuner, Mrs. McKee was also passed by the state.

OSCAR HOPPER

Oscar Hopper, a native son of La Grande and the Grande Ronde valley, died suddenly Saturday, while on his way home from work. He became ill and was rushed to the hospital, but death came before he reached there. Heart failure was the cause of his death, which occurred at 5:20 o'clock.

The deceased had been ill for some time, although the ailment was not considered serious and he was able to continue his work as boiler maker for the O.-W.-R. and N., where he had been employed in the same capacity for 28 years.

Oscar Kirk Hopper was born in Old Town, Oct. 8, 1874. In 1896 he was married to Zora Lane, here, and has since resided at the family home. He was the son of the late Joshua Hopper and Adeline Hopper, early pioneers to the Grande Ronde valley.

Besides his widow the following brothers and sisters survive him: Edward, of Pendleton; Walter, of La Grande; Thomas, of Mt. Hood; Ben, of Los Angeles; Cleve, of Shoshone, Ida.; Mrs. Clara Stratton, of Teton, Wyo.; Corbett, of Ashland; Mrs. John Synhorst, of La Grande; Mrs. Wesley Andrews, of Baker; Mrs. George Walte, of Seattle; Mrs. Daisy Strayer, of Pasadena; and Mrs. Jennie Stack, and Mrs. Golda Watts, of Los Angeles.

The deceased was a member of the Modern Woodmen lodge and the Loyal Order of Moose. The funeral will be held from the Stodgrass and Zimmerman mortuary under the auspices of the Moose lodge at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The Rev. G. A. Polard of the Baptist church will officiate.
