Mr. and Mrs. Jay Breshers were visiting in Elgin Tuesday.

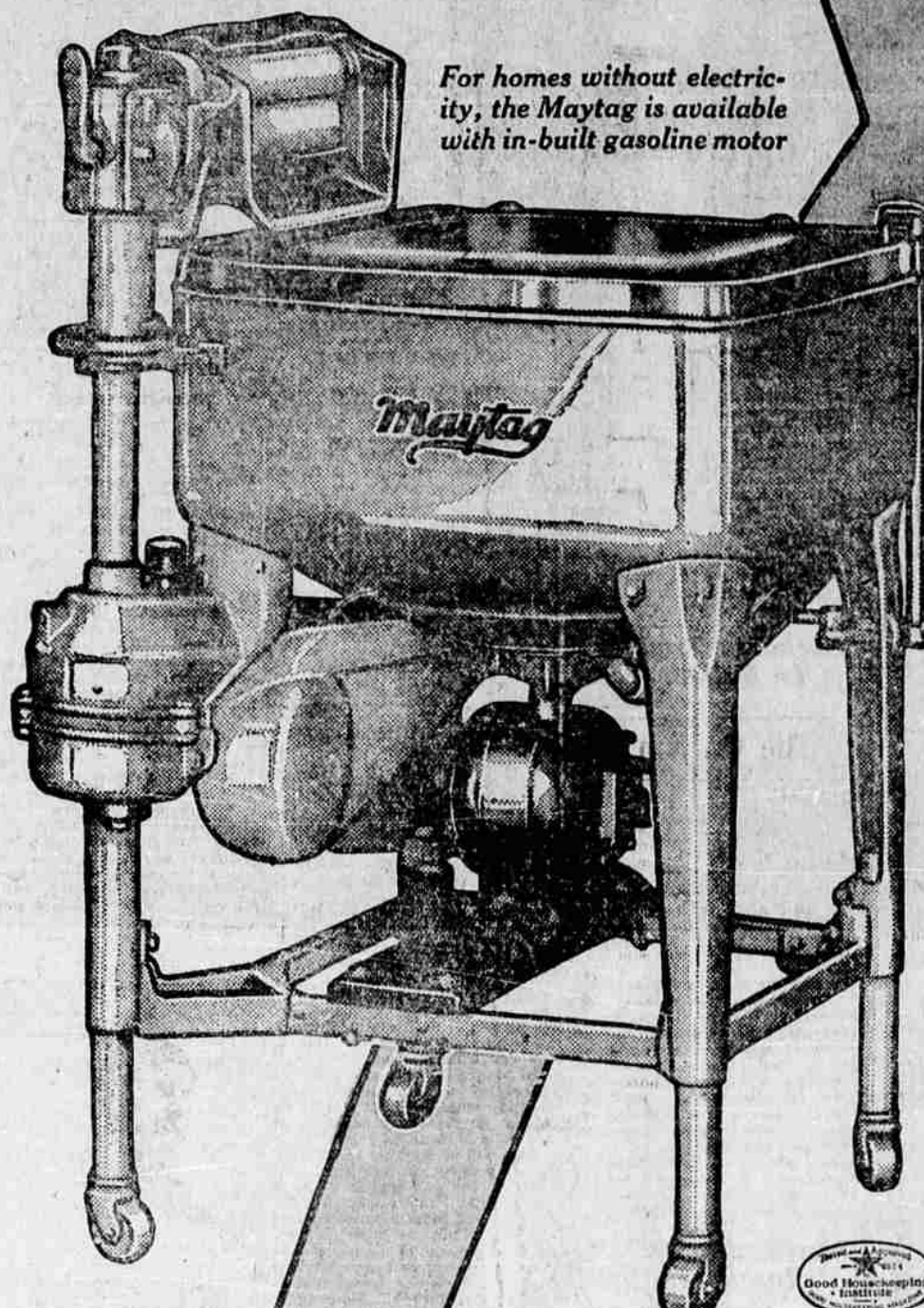
Mrs. Nancy Merritt has purchased the L. Denham house and will move into it about the first of May.
