MAC-HI SPRINTER LIKELY WINNER

Hufford Doped to Take
Two Firsts in East Oregon
Meet at Baker

PENDLETON, Ore., May 3.—Hufford, of MacLaughlin high school, is the favorite to win two firsts in the annual Eastern Oregon track and field meet at Baker May 7 as the result of his victories in the 100-yard dash and 220 in 23.3 seconds.

Allen, of Pendleton, negotiated the high hurdles in fast time and won the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet 9 inches. Allen also took the high jump at 5 feet 4 inches.

Smith, of Hermiston, threw the javelin 131 feet 8 inches and also won the shot, heaving the lead 35 feet 10 inches.

**Ask Owners Of
Dogs To Refrain
From Field Runs**

Game Warden John Walden issued a warning today to owners of hunting dogs not to conduct trials in fields at this time of the year because of the damage to young pheasants and other game birds.

Mr. Walden points out that this is the nesting period for practically all game birds in the Grande Ronde valley and that serious damage to some of the young flocks may result from over-ambitious dogs.

"I think that it's wrong to allow dog owners to conduct trials at this time," he said. "Later on, it will not affect the birds to any extent."

Jap Delegation Would Reduce Arms In Trade For New Ratio

TOKYO, May 2. (AP)—The Japanese delegation to the three power armament conference, which expect to leave for Geneva early in May, will be ready and willing—even eager—to bring about further mutual disarmament if, by some hook or crook, it can effect a fractional change in the existing 5-5-3 ratio which will enable it to return to Japan and "save face" with the great untutored and more or less anti-foreign masses.

This is the opinion of foreign observers here who are close in touch with the government, the navy and particularly the Japanese press and its millions of readers.

Notwithstanding the fact that the Washington conference agreement has saved Japan several hundred million yen—which is thoroughly appreciated by financiers, economic experts and high government officials—the public has already resented the 5-5-3 ratio. The press, echoing its readers, is insistent that this ratio must not prevail in any auxiliary reduction agreement.

But if the Geneva delegation can come home with even a 5-5-3 ratio, it is felt that everybody's "face" will have been saved and public opinion properly soothed.

The real anxiety of the big men of Japan is financial and economic. The recent suspension of a number of banks in Tokyo because of shortage of funds brought home to the intelligent Japanese the seriousness of the situation. The balance of trade against Japan last year was about \$29,000,000 yen, Japan is taxed to the hilt now and the support and maintenance of even the present navy is a burden which daily grows heavier with decreasing domestic business and unfavorable trade balances.

But above food and ruinment in the Far East is "face." The Japanese will starve and die in the gutter before he will lose "face."

Consequently, even though further disarmament and economy are essential, the "face" problem must be solved by the Geneva delegates if they expect to return to Japan in safety.
