

ONTARIO BORDER TOWNS PREPARING

Repeal of Dry Law in Province Signal for Preliminary Activity

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 5 (AP)—Canadian "homes" for thirsty Americans are being prepared along the Ontario border.

The real estate activity is in anticipation of the inauguration of Ontario's liquor control system, tentatively set for May 15. Repeal of the province's temperance act has aroused interest over a stretch of miles on the Canadian side of the border in possibilities for developing plans that will meet the Ontario definition of "homes."

The government will sell "hard" liquor, and either residents or tourists may drink in their homes, tourists' camps, hotels and boarding houses coming under this classification. Liquor permits will be sold to citizens, and a citizen, under the meaning of the law, is anyone who has resided 30 days in the community. A liquor permit, good for 30 days, will be sold for \$2.

A rush of millions of Americans, is expected during the summer months, and extensive plans are being made to assist them in being "at home."

Along the Niagara frontier, ranging between Lakes Erie and Ontario, there are many small hotels ready to cater to Americans, as they attempted to do when 4.4 beer went on sale in 1925. The beer law permitted serving at tables, but under the new regulations rooms must be made available.

For years many wealthy Americans have owned Canadian homes. The influx this year, however, will not be confined to the rich.

The construction of the international "Peace Bridge," across the Niagara between Buffalo and Fort Erie, Ont., caused a distinct advance in real estate values, and the new liquor law has added another decided boost.

Since the bridge was built the vast undeveloped farming section west of Fort Erie and along the north shore has opened to Americans possibilities of home sites, and there has been a movement away from crowded suburbs on the American side. That situation has excited for several years, but it has increased since the liquor law became a certainty.

PEERLESS MONOCLE

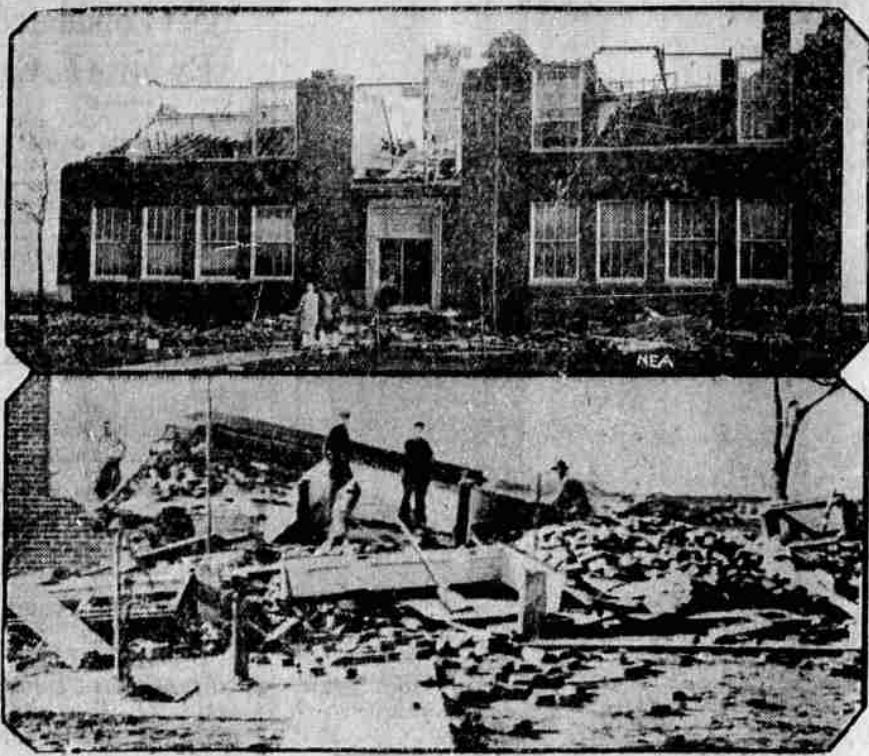

BRITISH NOTE IS RECEIVED IN U. S.

Official Restatement from Washington Sought on Debt Statement

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Great Britain has sought an official restatement from the Washington government arising from Secretary Mellon's letter to President Hibben, of Princeton University, regarding the British war debt but Secretary Kellogg, in a two-paragraph note, has replied that the discussion was purely domestic and that no desire for diplomatic exchanges is entertained.

To the opinion expressed in the British note, however, that Mr. Mellon's letter was in some instances inaccurate and that some declaration seemed advisable "to remove the unfortunate impression that has been created" the American treasury secretary countered with a lengthy statement devoted to defense of his Hibben communication and a reiteration that cancellation of war debts would place an unjust burden upon the American people.

Specifically, the British note complained against what it termed the misleading impression given by Mr. Mellon that Great Britain's debt payments to the United States will not constitute a drain on England's economic resources and that she is receiving in reparations from other nations more than her payments to the American treasury.

Farm Pointers

It makes no difference whether potatoes are planted before the full of the moon or afterwards, provided the physical character of the soil is good and weather conditions favorable.

To make the horse that bolts his grain eat more slowly feed the grain spread out in a large, flat box containing several smooth stones about three inches in diameter, or mix it with bran, cut hay or similar feed.

Use French dressing with springtime salads, and choose combinations of ingredients that will be refreshing to the eye as well as to the palate. Pile the salad lightly on individual plates, with something from each color group, and pass crisp crackers, cheese straws or bread sticks.

All non-acid vegetables should be canned under steam pressure. Tomatoes, pickled beets and pimientos are the only vegetables for which the water bath canner is recommended.

Use sturdy, washable materials for kitchen curtains. Make them with a tuck in or near the heading to allow for shrinkage. Unbleached muslin, gingham, glass toweling, English prints or Japanese crepe are good materials to use.

When buying cotton goods by the yard unravel a yarn and untwist it. Then pull out the small tufts of the fibers. Are the fibers of the same length or in different lengths? Cotton fibers vary from three-fourth to one and three-fourth inches. The fabric with the longest fibers, if of regular length, will wear the best.

The main reason for keeping milk production records is to find out which cows are profitable and which are not. The inferior cows can then be disposed of and the better ones kept for production and breeding purposes.

Accuse Lumberman In Robbery Case

EUREKA, Cal., May 5 (AP)—Alex Mosely, well known lumber company superintendent of Del Norte county and his two sons, Harold and Lawrence, were arrested by Sheriff John Breen yesterday in connection with the robbery of the Liberty bank of Crescent City last October. A grand jury returned a secret indictment charging the three with first degree robbery. They were released on \$5,000 bail pending arraignment which was set for July 1.

Their arrest followed an investigation which extended over practically half of the year.

It was at the Mosely ranch near Crescent City that John Boff, James Bennett and Raymond Cullison, confessed robbers of the bank were captured. They were found secreted in a cellar beneath a dairy barn. The men admitted the robbery and are serving sentences. Bennett and Cullison at Folsom and Boff at San Quentin.

LOST JAPANESE TOWNS REVEALED IN CENSUS

HAKODATE, Japan May 5 (AP)—Census takers have discovered far in the mountains of Northern Japan, a village which has been lost to the world. Its 152 inhabitants do not speak modern Japanese. They dress in styles of centuries gone by, blacken their teeth, live entirely on fruits and vegetables, and none of them ever heard of the outside world.

Investigators think they descended from the Heian clan, which was defeated by the warring Genji about 700 years ago. Its survivors fled and disappeared into the mountains.
