WHOLESALE SPUD PRICE IS FIRMER

Old Crop Potato Supplies Thinning Out—Butter and Eggs Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5 (AP)—With local old crop potato supplies thinning out and shipments of Texas carrels about ended, the wholesale market on the tubers is firmer here. California carrels are beginning to arrive. Mid-week wholesale prices have been as follows:

Oregon Burbanks No. 1, \$3.25; No. 2, \$2.50; No. 3, \$2.00. New crop—Texas Bliss Triumphs and California Garnets, 6 to 7c per pound.

Under influence of lighter receipts local asparagus has strengthened to \$1.75 per dozen bunches with most dealers.

Wholesale butter and egg prices are again steady today, no changes having been effected by dairy exchange transactions. Receipts of both are strong. Egg storage was swollen by 255 cases yesterday to a total of 42,139.

Trading in dressed country meats and poultry is slower than usual at unchanged prices.

Bulls Continue In Control Of Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Speculators for the advance, taking advantage of an over-crowded short interest in many issues, continued to mark up prices in today's stock market. Strenuous resistance developed in some issues, but this failed to halt the general advance, gains of 1 to 3 points being scattered throughout the list.

Oils gathered strength and public utilities continued to respond to reports of expanding earnings. Brooklyn Union Gas, Brooklyn Edison, Detroit Edison, Pacific Gas and Electric Light and Power all recorded good gains.

General Motors continued to anticipate a record-breaking first quarter earnings report, and the probable distribution of another extra cash dividend.

The closing was firm. Short-term issues of the speculative share were punished relentlessly in the final hour. Colorado Fuel crossing 30 and Mack Trucks 115. Some of the volatile issues moved upward in impressive fashion. Commercial Solvents "B" gaining more than 11 points. South Porto Rico Sugar, International Silver and Continental Insurance also made striking advances. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.
