## EXPECTS TIGERS WILL WIN MEET

### La Grande Favored to Take Annual East Oregon Event Tomorrow

The La Grande high school track and field team, Eastern Oregon champions in 1925 and 1926, are favored by most sport fans to make it three in a row Saturday at Baker when the annual Eastern Oregon meet is run off.

The Tigers, if they win, will be the second school in this part of the state to cop three consecutive meets. Pendleton accomplished this twice, in 1914, 15, 16 and in 1921, 22, 23.

The blue and white supporters are relying mainly upon its distance men, Davis and Anson; Smutz, quarter miler and furlong artist; Keffer, weight man and sprinter; Vaught, broad jumper; Charlton, weight man; Lyman, pole vaulter, hurdler and high jumper; and Price, hurdler and weight.

In addition several other members of the squad are expected to take a number of points.

#### Expect Some First

Dopesters figure that La Grande will take first places in the pole vault, the mile, the half mile, the quarter mile, the discus and possibly the javelin and high hurdles.

Cox of Union, is expected to win the shot put and Allen, of Pendleton, is hoped to come home with broad jump honors and possibly high jump and high hurdle firsts.

#### The Dashes

The 100 and 220-yard dashes rest between a trio of sprinters, Hufford, of Maehi; Smutz, of La Grande; and McCord, of Baker.

Hufford and McCord will fight it out in the century and Smutz is conceded a chance in the furlong.

Local fans, after sharpening their pencils and doing a little figuring, expect the Tigers to score around 45 points—which is ordinarily good for first place in an Eastern Oregon meet.

The relay race is expected to be the most thrilling event of the day this year, with seven teams entered.

La Grande, Baker, Pilot Rock, Milton-Freewater, Pendleton, Enterprise and Union have signified their intentions of participating in the relay and, of the seven, Pendleton and La Grande are expected to be the strongest, with odds slightly favoring the Buckaroos.

#### Some Records Menaced

Several records are in danger. The pole vault, mile, discus, broad jump and 440-yard dash marks may be bettered. The hurdle, sprint, shotput, javelin, high jump, relay and half mile, most believe, will stand after the dust clears away from the Baker field Saturday.

Following the East Oregon meet, several teams are expected to enter the state meet at Corvallis May 14, including La Grande, Pendleton, Enterprise, Baker and Milton-Freewater.
