Vera Reynolds Is Star In "Sunny Side Up"

From pickles to paradise! Such is the path along which piquant Vera Reynolds is swept in "Sunny Side Up," which sees her in the role of "Sunny Decrow."

This production, which Donald Crisp directed, and which will be on view at the Sherry theater today only, is Miss Reynolds' first picture since her recent elevation to stardom.

Sunny is a poverty-stricken, though altogether sunny-dispositioned little girl worker in a second-rate pickle works. By a twist of luck she is given a chance in a Broadway musical revue, and in a short time becomes the "hit" of the show.

The young theatrical producer, Stanley Dobington, played by Edmund Burns, who gives her, her big chance, falls in love with Sunny, and the two are happy in the belief that they are to be married in the near future. A genuine incentive to their happiness arises when Dobington's former wife, who had deserted him years before and sailed to Europe, ostensibly to get a divorce, returns to America minus her degree. She had married Dobington's fortune, and being of him had decided to try to work the European courts for a divorce. Unsuccessful she returns in an endeavor to make a clean-up.

How this menace is eventually erased and Sunny and Dobington find ultimate happiness is finely told in "Sunny Side Up." The film is the co-adaptation of Elmer Harris and Beulah Marie Dix from the novel "Sunny Durov" by Henry St. John Cooper. Other featured players of the cast are George K. Arthur, Ethel Clayton and Zasu Pitts.

Buck Jones Is Here In "The War Horse"

Buck Jones is riding on the screen of the Star theater today and Saturday in what is probably the best picture of his career, "The War Horse."

This is a swiftly moving, gripping tale of the horse's share toward winning the great war. In fact, it is an epic of man's best friend and his heroic participation on the battle fields of France. Fox films are to be commended for producing this fine tribute to the horse.

The story is that of Gray Eagle, played by Silver Buck, and his master, Buck Thomas, played by Buck Jones. Gray Eagle is commended by the army and shipped to France. His master, after a vain effort to keep him, joins the army and follows him across.

It is in France that a very fine series of scenes are pictured showing the horse's vital help in the great struggle. The production contains almost every element of entertainment. There is a dramatic beauty, especially in a charming sequence done in natural colors, charming love story, thrills, humanity and a splendid spirit of sacrifice that permeates the whole story in the person of "Mrs. O'Neill," the mother.

May McAvoy heads the cast and brings to her part her usual wistful charm. There will be no doubt as to Charles Ray's "comeback" after this production has been seen.

Others in the cast include Tom O'Brien, Holmeck Herbert, Eugene Heneser and others of note.
