

VETERANS MAKE GOOD ON FARMS

Fifteen Thousand Rehabilitated Fighters Get Living from Soil

The question "How are you going to keep 'em down on the farm" apparently has been answered by the Veterans' Bureau.

was not overlooked in the comprehensive rehabilitation program. The majority of men with this disability were found to be from rural environments and had as a background some form of farming experience.

Of the total rehabilitated along agricultural lines, 709 were of the collegiate type who have found employment in the various phases of farming for which they were trained.

The remaining 13,000 or more were rehabilitated by the project method, or training in independent farming. More than 90 per cent of those taught in this manner were at the time of completing their training, operating farms which they either owned or partly owned.

Rehabilitation of these men, the report said, has made it possible for many to return to their homes as "independent, self-sustaining and useful people, and the consciousness of being able to once again contribute something to the
