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Oregon Lettuce Now On Market

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7 (AP).—The Dulles district had sent the first Oregon lettuce to the local market. It is fresh and looks good but heads lack hardness to satisfy local dealers.

Cabbage is cleaned up and none expected till next week. Last stocks sold at \$7.50 per cwt.

Warmer weather is badly needed to hurry more Oregon vegetables to maturity in the fields. A little sunshine is about all that is necessary to bring the first Oregon strawberries on the market.

The butter market is very firm. Standards and prime firsts advanced 1/2c each today to 39 1/2c and 39c, respectively. Storage holdings were increased 19,424 pounds yesterday.

On the egg market extras are off a cent today to 22c. Other grades are unchanged. Yesterday's receipts were large at 2,954 cases. Poultry and dressed country meats are about steady with trading moderately active and supplies sufficient in most lines for the trade.

Wheat Closes Firm And Higher Today

CHICAGO, May 7 (AP).—Starting at 1/2c to 3/4c down, wheat later rallied to within 1/2c of yesterday's finish. Corn and oats reflected the changes in wheat, corn opening 1/2c to 1 1/2c lower and subsequently recovering nearly in full. Provisions were irregular.

Wheat closed firm, 1/2c to 3/4c higher; corn 1/2c to 3/4c off; oats 1/2c to 1c up and provisions varying from 1/2c decline to 3c advance.
