Scenes of Great Beauty Form The Setting For Big Colony of Lepers

KALAUAPA, Island of Molokai, Hawaii—Five hundred and twenty-three lepers, outcasts now even as in Biblical times, are serving out their lives here amid scenes of natural beauties that contrast with their stricken bodies.
This is the leper settlement of Hawaii, supported by the territory for its unfortunate victims of "mole" disease—the dreaded "Chinese sickness," which was brought to the islands, presumably from the Orient, in the second quarter of the nineteenth century.
Kalauapa peninsula, site of the settlement, is a natural prison. On one side is the broad Pacific brightened by the sunlight and color of the sub-tropics, on the other, towering cliffs.
A narrow trail, down which the mail is brought twice weekly, is the only land passage into the colony. The few ships that call anchor about a half mile out and use lighters to communicate with the shore.
No Desire to Escape
Desire to escape from the settlement is not apparent. Inhabitants soon fall into the life of the colony. Within a few short years their connections with the outside world are broken. Molokai becomes their only home.
The leper colony is divided into two villages—Kalauapa and Kalawao, which, with the land between, make up Kalawao county. The patients have their own county government, their own sheriff and police, their own district judge.
The territory has built a hospital at Kalauapa in which thousands of lepers are housed. Only the superintendent of the colony, the settlement doctor, the Catholic brothers

Project Trouble Is Aired Before Dr. Elwood Mead

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Problems of the Stanford Irrigation project were laid before Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation here today by a delegation, consisting of F. A. Baker, J. D. Wallace and James A. Fee. They told Dr. Mead that the district was in precarious condition because of lack of sufficient water.
While there is an abundance of water available from the McKay reservoir, recently completed, the Stanford project ditches are inadequate to carry sufficient water to irrigate the land, Dr. Mead was told.
In reply to a plea for government help, Dr. Mead said that the government would do nothing unless the non-resident owners of land in the district would be willing to sign a irrevocable deed. He said that irrevocable districts in which there are individual ownerships in excess of 160 acres will not be given financial assistance by the federal government.
Under present conditions owners are paying from \$5 to \$6 a year in assessments which is a burden too great to stand," explained F. A. Baker. "That assessment makes it extremely difficult for us to obtain settlers. If the canals were enlarged to provide adequate water there would be many new settlers and our problem would be solved."

COURT HOUSE, JACKSONVILLE, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Fred Smith, chief counsel for the defense in the trial of Hugh De Autremont, charged as a participant in the Siskiyou tunnel murders and train robbery, this morning revealed that the defense counsel is "receiving no cooperation whatsoever from any organization or person."
