

LINERS TAKE UP SEARCH FOR TWO

Trans-Atlantic Vessels at Sea to Watch for Nungesser and Goll

NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—Organized search for Captains Charles Nungesser and Francois Goll, missing Paris-New York airmen, was started by trans-Atlantic vessels at sea today.

Three passenger liners, the Westphalia of the Hamburg American line, the Conqueror Cameronia and the U. S. liner George Washington, and the freighter, West Apau, voluntarily enlisted in the hunt as soon as they received radio messages from the Independent Wireless company here that the aviators had not been heard from since they left Europe.

No Trace of Pair
The ships reported they had seen no trace of the pair. Besides the vessels notified by the Independent Wireless company, masters of other trans-Atlantic craft have been asked to be on the lookout for the missing airmen.

The West Apau was 571 miles east of Ambrose light at noon yesterday and the Cameronia today was about 1600 miles out. The George Washington is due Friday while the Westphalia was listed to arrive today.

Generally fair weather prevailed at the points in the Atlantic ship lane where the vessels were when they joined the search, although a heavy fog blanketed the North Atlantic coast throughout yesterday and early today. Rough seas prevailed in the locality of the George Washington.

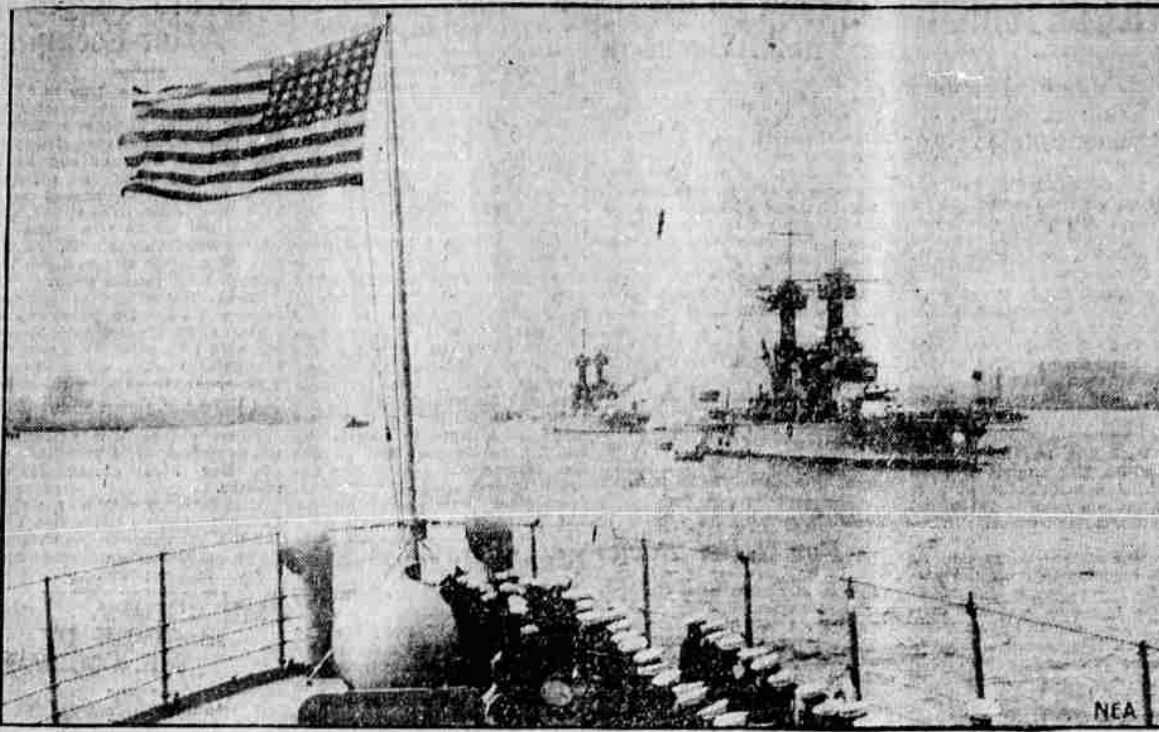
Vessels are several days apart, radio men noted, so that a vast stretch of the great circle trans-Atlantic ship lane may be watched with increased care.

Would Stay Aloft

The hope that Nungesser and Goll, if forced to alight at sea, could be reached by some ship, was increased by the fact that the buoyancy of the plane would keep it aloft at least 24 hours. Nungesser had predicted he would be able to remain aloft "indefinitely."

The frame work of the wings and the fuselage is built of wood and the "doped" canvas of the fuselage had been attached in water-tight fashion. However, the canvas might easily split if a violent landing was made and the wooden frame work would be easy prey for rough seas. But so long as the frame remained attached to the gas tanks, if they were empty, it is believed the fliers could remain on the surface indefinitely.

AMERICA'S ARMADA CALLS



The mightiest armada America has ever seen—the combined Atlantic and Pacific fleets of the U. S. navy—paid New York the most spectacular visit with which that city was ever honored. One hundred and twenty-two warships, great and small, steamed up New York bay and the Hudson river after weeks spent at sea in maneuvers. This photo of the event was taken on the Hudson from the stern of the Seattle, flagship of Admiral C. F. Hughes, the commander-in-chief. Immediately in the rear is the battleship Arizona. The armada brought to New York more than 30,000 officers and enlisted men of the navy and marine corps.

A water filter, food and life buoys were also carried by the armada.

UNION, May 10 (Special)—Fire destroyed the W. A. Maxwell house and contents in North Union at about two o'clock Friday morning. Mr. Maxwell was alone in the house and was awakened by the smoke and flames. He was near-

ly suffocated and received several burns in escaping from the building, which was a mass of flames inside. A neighbor heard him calling for help and turned in the fire alarm, but the fire had already gained such headway that it was impossible to save the building. The house was insured for \$1500, which practically covers the loss. The origin of the fire is unknown.
