Now his followers give him an even chance to break the world's 440-yard dash record of 47.2 seconds made by Ted Meredith in 1916. He has already this season broken the circuit for a mark of 47.4 seconds. The patience and skill of Coach R. L. Thompson are given a large share of the credit for the completeness of Spencer's recovery.

## QUITE AN ATHLETE

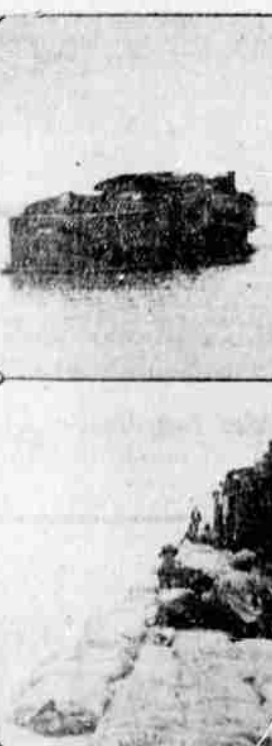

Hope to Wrest Amateur Crown from Jess Sweetser, American Champ

HOYLAKE, Eng.—The golfing clans of Britain are gathering on the plains of Hoylake, bent on capturing the old country the cherished amateur golfing crown which Jess Sweetser, an American, took from them last summer.

No native-born American ever before had turned the trick. The British want their title back from him. Anxiety increases lest the amateur championship, like the senior "open" now held by Bobby Jones, should get the habit of crossing the Atlantic year after year.

Sweetser absent. With Sweetser not here to defend his title, and few other Americans in the field, which begins on May 23, the names of native British, Wethered, Tolley, Head, Holderness and Robert Harris are offered as likely winners. All but Head have been amateur champions since the World war.

The small American contingent in the event is slated to include Walter L. Richard and Miss M. Newton of New York; W. C. Hunt of Houston, Texas; and H. C. Poyner of Pittsburgh, son of W. C. Poyner, president of the United States Golf association. None of these players, however, ever has attained top flight ranking in the United States.

Headed, a huge Irishman with little style but great effectiveness in his game, is one of the best match players in this country. The championship is match play throughout.

Roger Wethered and Cyril Tolley have recovered their old golfing form. In Tolley's case this is no mean accomplishment, considering his drubbing from Bobby Jones, 12 up and 11 to play, in the 1925 Walker Cup contest.

The Hoylake course, skirting the Irish Sea near Liverpool, with gulches of 750, par 12, trees upon a slope of humps and hollows, and sand wastes and solid spring turf, has all the peculiar natural hazards, including wind and weather, that add to the uncertainty of British seaside golf.

Hoylake is more difficult than ever, with a new short hole, trees stretched to the limit and new bunkers dotting the landscape. The new hole is built on natural ground, with the tee in sandhills, then 175 yards of rough and turn-hole country to a long, narrow green, pinched by innumerable bunkers.

## TO PAY LIBERALS \$10 FOR RIFLES

More U. S. Marines Ordered to Nicaragua to Enforce Ruling

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 11 (AP)—Liberals who turn over their arms to United States marines are to receive \$10 for each rifle or machine gun. The money will be paid by the conservative government.

Plans were under way today to drop from airplanes and otherwise disseminate thousands of copies of a proclamation, drawn up by Rear Admiral Lathimer, commander of United States naval forces in Nicaragua.

The proclamation says that the admiral has been directed by the United States government to accept the custody of the arms and ammunition of those willing to give them up, including the government forces, and to disarm forcibly those who do not peacefully deliver up their arms. Only the liberals will be paid.

Disarmament Necessary. The United States government, the proclamation declares, "having accepted the request of the Nicaraguan government to supervise the elections in 1925, believes general disarmament necessary for the proper and successful conduct of such elections."

The proclamation adds that the Nicaraguan government has extended amnesty to all political and armed opponents, and that to facilitate the return to peaceful occupations of those heretofore opposing the Nicaraguan government ten cordobas (\$10) will be paid by the government to each individual who turns over to the United States

## Woman Bowler

Eight hundred conservatives came into Managua last night for the purpose of laying down their arms. Arrivals from Matagalpa, however, reported that the liberals along the route declared they would not turn in their arms as there was not a sufficient number of marines in the Matagalpa section to enforce the order of Admiral Lathimer.

The first antagonistic act since the truce in the civil warfare between the conservative and liberal factions occurred yesterday at Chinandega. A band of former troops under General Chacala, who calls himself a liberal, but who is described by the liberals as a bandit, entered the outskirts of Chinandega, killing a half dozen natives, wounding a few others and engaging in an orgy of plundering. They fled before the arrival of marines concentrated near the highway.

TO SEND MORE MARINES. WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Killing orders have been issued for the 400 marines recently ordered to reinforce Admiral Lathimer's command in Nicaragua.

TO SEARCH FOR FLYERS. NAYRE, France, May 11 (AP)—The liner France, leaving tonight for New York, has been ordered by the French line to follow the route of Captain Nussenger's plane as supposed to have taken in the hope of rescuing the aviator.

## Lindbergh Completes First Leg of Cross Continent Flight Early Today

ST. LOUIS, May 11. (AP)—most of the way and my altitude from the Pacific ocean to the Mississippi river overnight, Captain Charles Lindbergh "hopped" in the monoplane he plans to fly from New York to Paris, reaching St. Louis at 3 a. m. today, 14 hours and five minutes after his start from San Diego, Cal., at 5:55 p. m. St. Louis time yesterday.

The first 1550-mile leg of his journey to New York whence he will take off in a week or ten days on the trans-Atlantic flight on a course similar to that planned for the Coli-Nussenger flight, was completed in three hours less than Lindbergh had planned.

Lindbergh plans to leave in a day or two in his single seater plane for New York. He is a flight commander in the Missouri national guard air service.

Flies by Compass. "I set a straight line for St. Louis and flew by the compass all the way," Captain Lindbergh said when he landed. "My flying time was better than 100 miles an hour."
