LOG RATE HEARING SET

SALEM, Ore., May 11. (AP)—Unjust and discriminatory rates on logs are being fought by the Braymill White Pine company in its complaint against the California North-eastern railway, or the Southern Pacific company, in which a hearing will be held by the public service commission at Klamath Falls on May 13. Rates between Ivah and Klamath Falls, California, Braymill and Kik are involved. Records in the hands of the service commission show that a rate of about \$10 a car is charged between Klamath Falls and Ivah, a distance of 16 miles, while the rate from Braymill to Klamath Falls, a distance of 31 miles, is only \$12.50.
