298 ATHLETES IN CORVALLIS MEET

Paul Schissler Coaching Officials to Run Off Events Quickly

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 12.—With 298 schools officially entered and five unofficially, 298 high school athletes have been entered for the Oregon state intercollegiate track and field meet at Oregon Agricultural college Saturday.

Detailed entry lists have been received from Astoria, Albany, Bandon, Baker, Beaverton, Benson (Portland), Bend, Commerce (Portland), Corvallis, Dufur, Enterprise, Franklin (Portland), Grant (Portland), Grants Pass, Hood River, Independence, Jefferson (Portland), La Grande, Lincoln (Portland), Marshfield, Madras, Milton-Freewater, McMinnville, Myrtle Point, Mouthout, North Bend, Rainier, Roseburg, Roseview (Portland), Roseburg, Seaside, Salem, Union, Washington (Portland), and Wasco.

Unofficial entries have been received from Cottage Grove, Hay Creek, Echo, Eugene and St. Helens. La Grande high, champion of Eastern Oregon, will have a line-up of entries in most of the 14 events.

The arrival of entries from Grant high in Portland makes all eight Portland schools scheduled to participate. The metropolitan athletes are expected to score a large amount of points but keen competition in Portland track meets indicate a wide split of markers.

Fast Meet Indicated. Paul J. Schissler, Aggie track coach, has organized his big squad of officials, in preparation for running the meet off in fast time, and with smooth team work.

The Washington O. A. C. meet, directed by Schissler last week, was run off in an hour and three-quarters. Preliminaries for the meet are scheduled for Saturday morning. Following preliminaries, a luncheon in the college tea room of special food selected by Dad Butler, O. A. C. track coach, will be served to all high school athletes.

At 12:45 o'clock athletes, coaches and officials of the meet, will parade on Bell field after the fashion of the Olympic games, led by the O. A. C. band. After the firing of a salute by the big guns of the military department, the meet will get under way, with the first event, the pole-vault, scheduled for 1:30 o'clock, followed at once by the high jump and the shot put.

Don't Fear Rain. The weather outlook is none too encouraging, although rain is not feared unless it falls in torrents. The condition of the O. A. C. cinder track is such that it will withstand an ordinary rain. Cold weather, however, would stiffen the muscles of the competitors and mean poorer marks.

Extrics of some Central Oregon schools hinge upon the weather. Bend, Dufur, Madras and others in that locality, who will have to come over the McKenzie pass, may not be on hand if the weather in the Cascades is adverse. All of these schools, however, will make an effort to surmount any difficulties the weather may place before them.
