Tried To Sell N. Y. To Indians; Arrested

MONTREAL, May 12. (AP)—Indians were indicted, shown today against Orin Kellogg, former Wisconsin lawyer, his wife and her brother, Chief W. K. Cornelius of the Iroquois Indians, all of whom are charged with conspiracy and obtaining \$15,000 under false pretenses from Indians of four Quebec and two Ontario reservations. They are accused of promoting a fraud to "sell the state of New York" back to the Indians. Each originally fixed at \$500 each was increased to \$12,500. Their cases will come up in September.

on improvement district No. 184, providing for macadamizing Rock Ridge from Adams to Jefferson and installing sidewalks and curbs. The contract was let to Clyde E. Seitz, who bid \$1,787.45. The engineer's estimate was \$1,802.94.

Discussion relative to the proposed improvement on the north side in a district in which the La Grande Irrigation ditch company is affected, was followed by a statement by A. T. Hill, president of the commission, that he favored a reorganization of the district. City Attorney Colon R.
