Annual Scholarship for Union County Is Given to Cove Girl

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 12.—Carmen Daniel of Cove has been awarded the Union Pacific scholarship for Union county according to reports received by H. C. Sey-

mour, state club leader. Miss Daniel, 15, and a senior in high school, has been in club work five years. She is entraining in club work having won first place in her county in Cal and 1st club work, won the Hollywood Special prize for the outstanding Holstein club member in the state and Pacific International in 1926. She was also declared by the Holstein-Friesian association as the outstanding Holstein girl club member in the United States.

Clifford Conrad Alternate. Clifford Conrad was chosen as alternate will receive the scholarship if Miss Daniel is unable to accept it. Conrad has had six

years of club work and won first in Union county in pig project. He was a member of the stock judging team that was third place at the Pacific International Livestock exposition. He is 18 and a sophomore in high school. The Union Pacific system offers \$100 scholarship in a full term agricultural or home economics course in O. A. C. to the boys and girls between 14 and 21 ranking highest in 4-H club work in counties through which this railroad runs.

is chosen from the 15 boys and girls ranking highest in county club projects as outlined by the extension service of O. A. C. and is selected by a committee of three persons, consisting of the county superintendent, one person appointed by the president or state club leader of O. A. C. and a third member chosen by these two. An alternate club member is chosen for each county by this committee and is awarded the scholarship if the other person is unable to accept it.
