POSTPONE TRIAL FALL, SINCLAIR

Columbia Supreme Court Sets Date of Oct. 17 Instead of May 23

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Trial of the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case was postponed today in the District of Columbia supreme court from May 23 to October 17.
Continuation of the case was asked by government counsel as they further effort might be made to serve a subpoena on James P. O'Neill, former president of Pacific Oil and Gas company, described as a "pivotal" witness in the case.
Preliminary report was made to the court that a subpoena had been served on H. P. Blackmer, former chairman of the board of the Missouri Refining company. The subpoena was served by an American consul on a train between Monticarlo and Nice, France.
Owen J. Roberts told Justice Hitz that he assumed Blackmer would appear in response to the subpoena although the long distance oil operator refused to accept.
The court session when the American counsel tendered it to Hitz. He also refused to accept \$250,000 as his expense money for his return to the U. S.
The testimony of O'Neill and Blackmer is sought in connection with the organization of the Continental Trading company. The government has contended that Albert R. Paul, former secretary of the interior who negotiated the lease of Tropic Point naval oil reserve to Harry Sinclair, oil operator, received \$250,000 in bribes—bonds obtained by Sinclair from the company.
Sinclair's sentence for contempt of the senate which was to have been announced on next Monday, was postponed today by Justice Hitz until next Friday. Sinclair's attorneys making the plea that he had important business affairs to attend in the meantime. Sinclair was found guilty of refusing to answer questions of the senate committee.

"Their splendid courage has touched the imagination of Americans and there is everywhere the most earnest hope that they may still be found. I assure you that this government is doing every thing humanly possible to assist in the search and I trust that this search may bear its success."

OFFERS REWARD

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—A reward of \$1000 for any aviator who discovers either of the missing French flyers or traces of their airplane has been posted by Raymond Orde, sponsor of the \$25,000 New York-Paris flight prize.
LARKHURST, N. J., May 12.—The navy destroyer, USS Anselmo left its station here at 2:30 today (light time) this morning on a relief cruise along the Atlantic coast during which a search will be kept for possible traces of Nungesser and Gollé, the missing French aviators.

TWO READY TO FLY

NEW YORK, May 12 (AP)—Three American planes started for Boston today to Paris via the North Atlantic route.
At Curtis field was the Delaney biplane-Columbia in which Charles G. Chamberlin and Lloyd Best and had hoped to hop off early this morning but unfavorable weather reports caused them to decide postponement.
Beside it was the Ryan state center biplane, "The Spirit of St. Louis" in which Captain Charles Lindbergh flew from San Diego, Calif. in two days preliminary to a flight to France, which may now develop into a race with the Delaney.
