Trouble Breaks Out in Flyers' Camp in Mineola MINEOLA, N. Y., May 16, (AP)—Discipline broke out anew in the Chamberlain-Bertrand flying camp today.
At Mineola G. Ballance, designer of the plane in which the aviators will try to fly to Paris, announced a last flight to Washington, D. C. When time came for the proposed flight and the plane stayed in its hangar, Chamberlain and Bertrand said they had no intention of going to Washington. They had been quoted by Ballance as having agreed to go.
Another disagreement arose during the day over the advisability of carrying radio equipment on the Ballance plane. This afternoon Charles Levine, head of the company backing the flight, stated that he thought it best for the 60 pound set to be left behind. Bertrand replied with the positive assertion that he would not make the attempt without radio. Chamberlain declined to enter the controversy publicly.

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SEEKING SECRETS OF HERCULEANEUM (Continued from Page One) work, after showing the king 20 square feet of carefully preserved ancient masonry that was dug out during the experimental searching, told him that the principal objects of the present excavations were to find the library of an ordinary citizen of Herculeaneum and some of the popular Roman comedies, copies of which have never been found. Under Four Domains Herodianus, before he fell to the Roman power in 68 B. C., lived successfully under Caesar, Brutus, Samnites and Greek dominion. It was succeeded by the son of Scipio, which destroyed Pompeii, the capital city.

GRADUATES HEAR SERMON BY MR. AWES (Continued from Page 1) ever developed the intellect may be, it will be seriously handicapped if its physical instrument is impaired. Good physical health is the first requisite for efficiency and success. "Everything depends upon a trained intelligence. Without this, power is misapplied, faith degenerates into superstition and love becomes insidious sentimentality." "Religion is the crown of life," he continued. "The four-square man will therefore be conscious that he lives, and moves, and has his being in the encompassing life of God. As a Christian he will give Jesus Christ a very central place in his social life of human relationships. Listen, my young friends! If you want to safeguard the higher interests of your life and possess the best, include in your life Jesus Christ. Faith in him will help you make God a living reality and source of moral and spiritual power equal to every emergency." Closing Message In closing Mr. Awes left this message with the graduating class: "We look to you, young people, to be leaders in this larger, world-embracing social order, the ruling spirit of which is brotherhood and whose guiding principle is cooperation rather than ruthless competition. "Young people, members of the graduating class of the La Grande high school, in the months and years that now are stretching out before you, are increasingly aware of your powers and opportunities. In the investment of your talents, may you never fail for lack of wisdom and self-control. Strive at all times to be true to the best. Seek in fellowship with the Master of us all instruction and guidance as you set forth on your high adventure. You are not then far the final outcome; for your treasures will be of a kind that neither moth nor rust can consume, and where thieves do not break through, nor steal."
