Menus

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Baked rhubarb, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon fried cornmeal, maple syrup, milk coffee.

LUNcheon—Cream of vegetable soup, broiled chicken, thin huddle of gratin, lettuce salad, sliced oranges, milk tea.

DINNER—Broiled mackerel, steak, new potatoes in hollandaise, creamed carrots, asparagus, baked whole wheat bread, praline whip, milk coffee.

Cream of watercress soup is delicious for a spring luncheon or is quite suitable for the first course of a fish dinner. If an elaborate dinner were served in place of the luncheon menu, the meal would answer admirably for a "company" luncheon.

Cream of Watercress Soup One bunch of watercress, 2 cups water, 2 slices onion, 2 table-spoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Wash, chop, shake, dry, and mince. Melt 1 tablespoon butter in soup kettle, add onion cut in small pieces and simmer without changing color for five minutes. Add cream and cold water and bring slowly to the boiling point. Simmer 20 minutes. Fry through a sieve. Melt remaining butter, stir in flour and when bubbling slowly, add milk, stirring constantly. Add salt and pepper and cream sauce. Bring to the boiling point and serve. A garnish of cream sprinkled with minced green peas may be served. May 17, 1927, NEA Service, Inc.

The Garden PLANT NOW FOR NEXT SPRING. Plant now for next spring's earliest crop out of the garden—potatoes and spring plant or celery. These two roots are at their best just with a pickax before the frost is out of the ground. They are all season growers and should be planted in some part of the garden where they will be out of the way and left to make their year's growth.

Both like mellow, rich soil and if root crops are desired they must be allowed to let the plants stand six inches apart in the rows. If the potatoes are left to fight it out, roots of uneven size will result, some being so small that it is hardly worth the trouble to prepare them for the table, while others will increase in weight and size and make edible roots.

By judicious thinning as soon as the plants are large enough to handle, the entire row of roots of uniform size is a simple accomplishment. The parsnip also furnishes a late fall crop, but most gardeners say it is not at its best and most sugary state until after the

Winter freezes. The safety of winter plant makes small roots at best, so it must be thinned to develop it so far as it will go, as a root in inch diameter is a big one. Thinning and occasional hoeing to keep the weeds down are all these two vegetables need. Once planted and thinned they take care of themselves without much fussing. They even form good roots when overgrown with weeds but will do better if given the same weeding as the rest of the garden.

The Minnesota Sandwich Island society gives the largest roots of uniform size, being twice the size of the other variety. The black variety, so called from the coloring of the roots, also known as "saxatras," is considered the finest by many, but is not as easy to raise as the white kind and needs more careful cultivation and fertilizing to develop.

Chile Places Woman Consul in Scotland

GLASGOW, Scotland—Chile's first and only woman consul is Miss Olga de la Barra whose father was served as consul from Chile to Scotland for the past eight years.

While Dr. de la Barra is in his native land for a six months' holiday, the Chilean government has officially appointed his 27-year-old daughter as consul-ad-interim, in full charge of affairs in the office.

She came to Scotland with him when she was 12 years old and attended the Ladies' Bank school in Glasgow. At 16, she became her father's secretary in the consulate, and during the last five years has several times taken charge of the consulate during his brief absences from Scotland.
