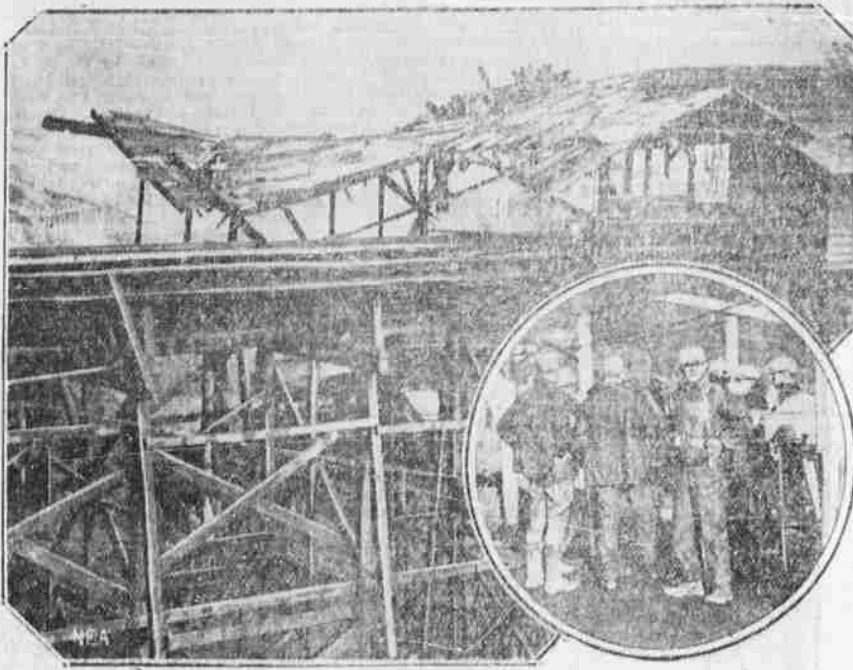

The explosion in the mine of the New England Fuel and Transportation company at Fairmont, W. Oil Controversy Rests Upon Real Grievance, Claim

NEW YORK, May 17, (AP)—The oil and land controversies between the United States and Mexico rest upon a real grievance on the part of American interests, but not one that justifies under such conditions of international law, any sort of forcible intervention in the internal affairs of that nation, states a report made public Monday by the department of research and education of the Federal Council of Churches.

The report is the result of several months investigation by the department of research and education and is introduced as a "strictly informational document," which discloses any intention to suggest what course either government should follow.

The petroleum law of 1915, says the report, is found to have contradictory features and to be at variance with the understandings arrived at in 1917 as a result of the recognition of the Mexican government by the United States. The report points out at the same time that such violence as has been done to American property rights arises out of sovereign acts of the Mexican republic in the adoption of her constitution and the enactment of domestic legislation, and that in the present state of international relations such action, including the United States, "demands the right to be the judge of its own domestic laws, always subject to the limitation that if the operation of those laws results in violation of rights under international law the victim of any resulting injustice may demand through his government, redress in the forms prescribed by international law."

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INVITES PATTERSON

SALFORD, May 17 (AP)—On behalf of Gov. Young of California, J. Grant Hinkle, secretary of state for the state of Washington, yesterday invited Gov. Patterson to

attend the dedication of the cable and bridge between Vallejo and Suisun, Calif., next Saturday. The Oregon governor will not attend, but will appoint a representative. Secretary of State Hinkle was on his way from California to Olympia, that will be news.

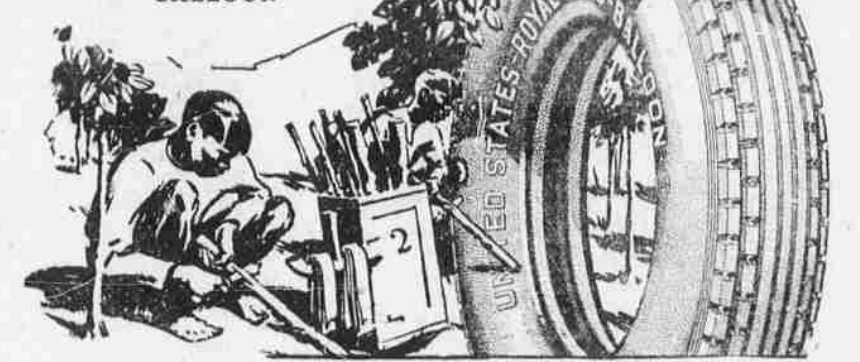
