Famous Comedian Dies On Atlantic

NEW YORK, May 18 (AP)—Death of sea of Sam Bernard, famous comedian, was reported today in a telegram from the liner Columbus to the North German Lloyd office here. The message contained no details beyond the information that Bernard had died on board last night of apoplexy. He was 54 years old.

The Columbus sailed from New York yesterday for Plymouth, Cherbourg and Bremen. Only two months ago 1200 members of the theatrical profession and others paid tribute at a dinner to Bernard in celebration of his 50th anniversary on the stage.

Bernard was born in England and made his debut at Henderson's music hall in Coney Island. He was highly successful in German character parts in musical comedies.

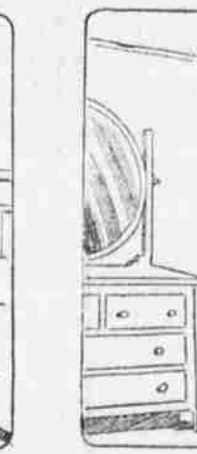

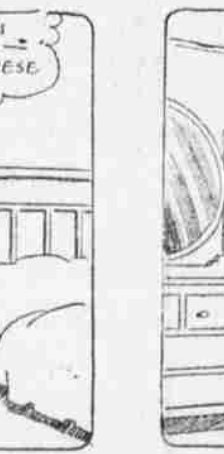
