Farm Pointers

Vetch produces considerable green feed in May but usually about June in Oregon, says the experiment station. Cutting it each day is best when used for green feed because it heats rapidly and decreases in palatability when piled.

Potato seed pieces weighing from 1 1/2 to 2 ounces give best stands and yields, according to results obtained by the Oregon experiment station. The blossoms and leaves are not so palatable as the tubers, but planted whole. A cutting of landplaster in the cut pieces prevents rotting in the ground.

Corn planted in cold, wet soil often rots, resulting in poor stand. Since the season is late this year good results may be obtained in Western Oregon with corn planted as late as May 20, says the experiment station. Ease of cultivation and freedom from weeds are obtained by planting corn in hills.

Soviet Delegates Present Demands

GENEVA, May 18 (AP)—The soviet delegates to the international economic conference served notice today that they would leave Geneva immediately unless assured of the adoption of a resolution recognizing the co-existence of the communist and capitalist economic systems and the possibility of peaceful collaboration between the two systems.

A soviet spokesman told the press that his delegation deemed the question vital to the world's restoration, following cooperation of the western countries with the soviet economic system necessary to any real progress.

PAISSE, May 18 (AP)—The "reconciliation meeting," provided for by French law in suits for divorce, was held today in the case of William K. Vanderbilt Jr., and his wife the former Virginia Fair. The meeting failed of result, and it is stated that the divorce will probably be granted within due course of time. Formal pleading, it is learned, will be held sometime in June. This is more or less of a formality, inasmuch as the essential details of the property distributor have already been settled out of court.
