Adjusted Output Of Lumber Work Favored By 4-L

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—Strongly endorsing a communication from 4-L, employees' members urging that both employers and employees in the lumber industry of the Pacific Northwest work for adjusted production of lumber, the 4-L board of directors has gone on record as heartily commending employee interest in manufacturing and selling problems. The resolution had been formulated by lumber employees in the district 1 and 2 of the 4-L, and later endorsed by many other local groups.

"The lumber industry is facing a situation where production regulation with curtailment and retrenchments appear vitally necessary," the resolution said in part.

Vocational rehabilitation of those injured in industry in the state of Washington was another matter brought before the board. It was pointed out that although both Oregon and Idaho have vocational training by the state for industry's unfortunates, there is no similar act in Washington. In this respect, a 4-L committee reported that 41 states now have some sort of vocational training; that 14,000 persons in 39 states are now undergoing training, and that during 1926 5,600 injured workmen had been trained in some useful occupation. The board ordered a committee to act with Washington legislators before the next session.

No Change Requested
No change in the minimum wage scale of the 4-L was requested or made.

The group disability insurance plan of the 4-L was reported to now be in force at 25 logging or lumbering operations; 537 claims have been paid since August 1, totaling \$136,143.

Second Division Will Celebrate End of The War

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., May 20 (AP)—The ninth anniversary of the beginning of the end of the world war and the tenth anniversary of the second division of the United States army will be observed here June 2, when that division celebrates its part in victories at Chateau Thierry, Belleau Wood, the Marne, the Argonne, and Champagne.

The celebration will be a part of the annual division day of the outfit, one of the most noted of the American Expeditionary forces. The division captured one-fourth of the prisoners taken by the Americans and suffered one-fourth of all the casualties of the United States troops.

One brigade, which helped the division write some of its most illustrious pages in history, will be absent. The Fourth Brigade, composed of marines during the war, was returned to the navy at the end of hostilities.

On June 2, 1918 the second division deployed across the Paris-Metz road, and met the spearhead of the last German drive on Paris. The Teuton advance was halted and six weeks later the second division shared in an allied drive which did not end until the Armistice.

The division was organized in France in 1917 and took part in the major battles in the closing years of the war. After the Armistice the division formed a part of the army of occupation in Germany and later returned to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where it is now stationed.

The exercises will include ceremonies and memorial services for the members of the division who lost their lives in the war.

Egyptians Sell Fake Mummies To Tourists, Police Officers Learn

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The American gold brick and Brooklyn Bridge salesmen have a match in the Egyptian souvenir vendors, the local police report.

According to complaints received by the police, the mummies of hunched Egyptian slaves have been decked out in regal trappings and sold to glibble tourists as authentic mummies of Pharaohs and Tutankhamens.

The sums paid for faked mummies, it is reported, have in some cases run into thousands of dollars.

To the natives the lot is a merry one. For mummies in Egypt are as plentiful as potatoes in Ireland. In many districts the natives dig them up and use them for firewood.

It is therefore a simple and a profitable matter for a nimble scavenger to dig up the mummy of some forgotten slave, transport it to his workshop and deck it out with a few gilded scarabs, inscription and amulets. It is then presented to the English or American traveler as a rare old Rameses or Amenhotep.

60 Per Cent Is Estimated Crop Of Loganberries

SALEM, Ore., May 20.—At a meeting of the northwest canners held in Seattle Saturday a general estimate of from 60 to 62 per cent of a crop for the northwest was placed on this year's loganberry crop, according to Robert C. Paulus, who has just returned from the meeting.

"It was considered too early to make an estimate on the cherry crop," he stated, "but the past few warm days will make possible an estimate in the near future."

"Good stocks of canned fruit are going out rapidly and at ridiculously low prices, or have been, and canners are all losing heavily on the carryover. The market, however, the past week, improved a trifle."

"Canned prunes in all grades and sizes are cleaned up, pears are cleaning up and there are still a few fancy cherries being carried, but the stock on these is low."

"Reports on this year's crop of prunes show that the hot weather has been bringing them on with a tremendous growth and within a short time it will be possible to see which of those now on the trees will drop off."
