GERMANY SENDING 100 TO OLYMPICS

AMSTERDAM, Holland — Germany seems to be determined to carry all before them by sheer weight of numbers at next year's



Olympic games here.

Preliminary figures issued by the Olympic committee show that of some 2,000 prospective competitors from 14 different nations 400 are Germans.

The United States and France are among those who do not get figure in the list, but even Great Britain is only sending about 250 men, and Japan and Italy 200 each.

Brazil and Finland are each sending 150 athletes, and other states less.

There will be no fewer than 10 German football players and as many swimmers, also large contingents of fencers—including women—horsemen, sailing, literary, wrestlers and boxers.

Tony Canzoneri To Fight Taylor For Bantam Title

CHICAGO—Tony Canzoneri, a New Orleans youngster with a Rooseveltian smile, has rushed in 19 months to the forefront of contention for the world bantamweight championship by knocking the footprints of the man he defeated—Felix Herman, last great bantamweight champion.

From the early days Canzoneri has followed Herman around, and today, at 21, he gives promise of overshadowing the spectacular ring career of his friend and teacher.

Choosing the worst year and a half since he fought his first professional bout, Canzoneri is matched for the second time to battle for the world bantamweight crown, an achievement remarkable in the history of glove fighting.

To Meet Taylor
He meets Buddy Taylor, blonde Terre Haute terror, here June 22 in a match figured to end dispute over ownership of the title. Taylor is regarded as champion in Illinois and 15 other states. He and Canzoneri fought ten slashing rounds here in March to a draw.

Canzoneri, like Herman, is a native of New Orleans. An Italian with the right imagination of his name, he became a worshiper of Herman at 12, and the association blossomed into warm friendship.

When 1916 retired in 1920 he gave long hours to developing the natural talent Tony possessed and found in him courage, skill, punch, tenacity and real ring smartness. After Tony won 17 straight amateur victories in New Orleans, Herman sent him to his old-time manager in New York, turning professional at 20, in 10 bouts he has won 24 decisions, scored ten knockouts, scored two no-decisions, fought three draws and lost a single decision.

If he conquers Taylor he will hold Herman's own record, for Felix began fighting in 1912 and was not champion until 1927.

Canzoneri's side split is a win-win. His arm reveals a row of teeth, white and wide, set as evenly as corn in a cob.
