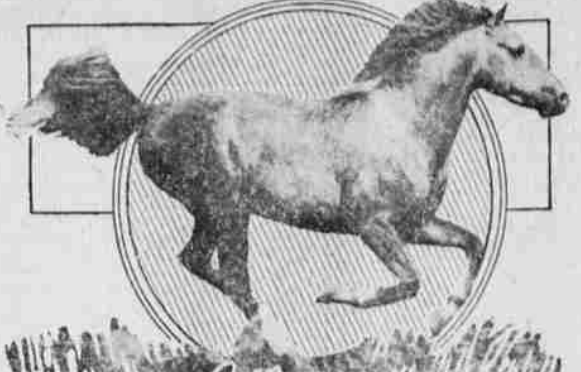
To Return Home—

DENIES SLAYING WESTERN PLAYER

Mrs. Sarah Kerrick Tells Court She Did Not Kill Her Husband

LOS ANGELES, May 21. (AP)—Mrs. Sarah Kerrick, between sobbing and fainting spells on the witness stand here today, denied she fired the shots which killed her husband, Tom Kerrick, film western player, and declared the gun was discharged accidentally during a scuffle. Mrs. Kerrick and four other members of a drinking party in Hollywood on April 8 are charged with Kerrick's murder.

The widow testified that she had taken the gun into the kitchen when her husband, Henry Isidell, member of the party and co-defendant of Mrs. Kerrick, was quarreling in another room of the flat. Anita Davis, another defendant, and Isidell followed her and in an effort to obtain the gun all fell in a heap into the breakfast nook where testimony showed the actor was shot. During the ensuing scuffle, she said, the gun was discharged.
