**Farm Pointers**

Sheep hillside which are particularly liable to erosion can be the long run be more profitably devoted to timber growing than to cultivated crops.

Low lands not adapted to farm crops will produce excellent stands of some species of timber within their natural range, such as cottonwood, red gum, elm, swamp white oak, and others of a moisture-loving kind.

A good grain ration for cows on fresh grass pasture is equal parts of ground oats, wheat bran and ground corn. Another suitable ration would be equal parts of ground oats and ground corn. As summer advances and the grass matures or becomes short, it will be advisable to add some higher protein feeds to the grain mixture.

The average production of potatoes per acre in the United States is very much lower than in Canada, Great Britain and European countries outside of Italy. One reason is that less attention has been given to the character of the seed.

In selling timber in the government forests, the forest service provides for reasonable opportunity of profitable business for the purchaser as well as for harvesting the mature timber and improving and safeguarding the next crop.

Burning the woods to "green up the grass" a practice employed by many eastern farmers because they claim stock seem to prefer to graze on burns in the spring, is a western plan and usually does far more damage than good. Stock do better on unburned range, and the grazing improves from year to year by the spread of carpet grass and lespedeza, which are destroyed by fires.
