HEALTH

"BACKACHES"

By Henry Keller, M. D., New York City. Member Georgia Memorial Inst. "The familiar term backache, though not very scientific, describes clinically an exceedingly common condition, familiar to every practitioner and surgeon, and about which much has been written."

Pains and aches in any part of the body tend to call the sufferer's attention to the presence of abnormal conditions in the system giving rise to those irritating stimuli. The healthy mind's usual response to such irritations is the attempt to locate the source whence these sensations originate.

The back, especially the lower part of the back, is especially subjected to a multiplicity of influences and disturbances, and at the slightest provocation may throw the normal machinery out of gear. This produces aches and pains, the origin of which may be very baffling, and at the same time tax the ingenuity of the best physician who, in order to do justice to his patient, may be forced to seek the advice of other physicians trained in special fields.

The first thing to be done is to ascertain the nature of the pain; whether it is localized or diffused; constant or intermittent; or if the pain depends upon the attitude assumed; also whether the pain is more severe at night or in the day time.

The kind of pain is also important to know. Thus, is the pain dragging down or boring, in character? All and every one of the enumerated pains have particular significance in helping the establishment of the proper diagnosis and
