**KANSAS BOXER NOW IN A "CIVIC ENTERPRISE"**  
DODGE CITY, Kan.—When "Hoot" Burger, light heavyweight boxer, went down under a knockout blow after he had won 20 consecutive victories, his home town followers did not turn away from their fallen idol.  
Instead they pooled \$12,500, bought Burger's contract from his managers and made him a "civic enterprise." They will send their 22-year-old prize to a boxing school in New York, and later he will seek the crown of the world's knockout king.

**SHORTSTOP ACHIEVES UNPAID TRIPLE PLAY**  
HOUSTON, Texas—Kiddie Hoek, shortstop of the Houston, Texas, League baseball club, made baseball history at Dallas when he executed an unassisted triple play against the Dallas Beavers recently.  
Records reveal only five parallel feats in the major leagues.  
With runners on first and second base, Joe Tate, third baseman of the Dallas club, lined to Hoek, who made a leaping one-handed catch. Hoek touched second to double the runner that had headed for third, and then ran toward second.

## BALLOON RACE MEMORIAL DAY

Distance Flight to Be Dedicated to World War Dead of America

AKRON, Ohio, May 25 (AP)—Fifteen huge gas bags will take the air here on Memorial day for a distance flight dedicated to the world war dead of the United States.

The pilot of each bag will seek favorable air currents which will carry his craft far from the starting point and who for him the Litchfield trophy, symbol of victory in the event, a share in the prize money and the right to represent the United States in the international balloon race to be held this fall in D-over.

The Memorial day event is the 1927 national elimination balloon race. In keeping with its patriotic dedication seven United States army and navy craft have been entered and a hundred airplanes will participate in an army, navy and marine corps flying program preceding the balloon race-off.  
Another symbolic touch has been added with the selection of Mrs. Martha Allen of Akron, fair of whose sons died in the world war, as sponsor for the balloon entered by The Akron Beacon-Journal. She has been designated by Gov. Vic Donahey of Ohio as the state's war mother.

The Litchfield trophy, put up by P. W. Litchfield, will become the permanent property of any chapter of the National Aeronautic association whose representatives win the race three successive times. Akron balloonists have won it for the past two years, and a victory by any of the seven Akron teams this year would bring the cup home for all time.

## Titled Englishman Is Held To Be Menace To U. S. Olympic Prospects

NEW YORK—Lord David Borthwick frankly admits he doesn't take his athletics "too seriously," but this titled British college student, quick witted and 24, proved that he was a menace to U. S. Olympic prospects in a 400-meter hurdle race at Amsterdam last year.

In three trips to America in the past few years, twice to compete in the Penn relays and the other time with the combined Oxford-Cambridge track and field team, Lord Borthwick has impressed critics with his steady development as a timber topper. He is the present British champion at both high and low hurdles, has more than held his own in competition on this side, losing only one race in a half dozen, and figures to be a keen rival for America's best talent in Holland.

**Lost One Pace.**  
Yankee hurdlers have dominated the Olympics since their revival in 1896. They have lost only one race over either the high or low sticks. That was in 1920 when Earl Thomson, the famous "Sandwich" who is still holder of world records, flew home first in the 110-meter high hurdles. But Thomson, although he wore the mantle last in Olympic competition, was a Dartmouth college student, developed by Harry Carr—former American coach and former Olympic title holder. Thomson now is an assistant coach at Yale.

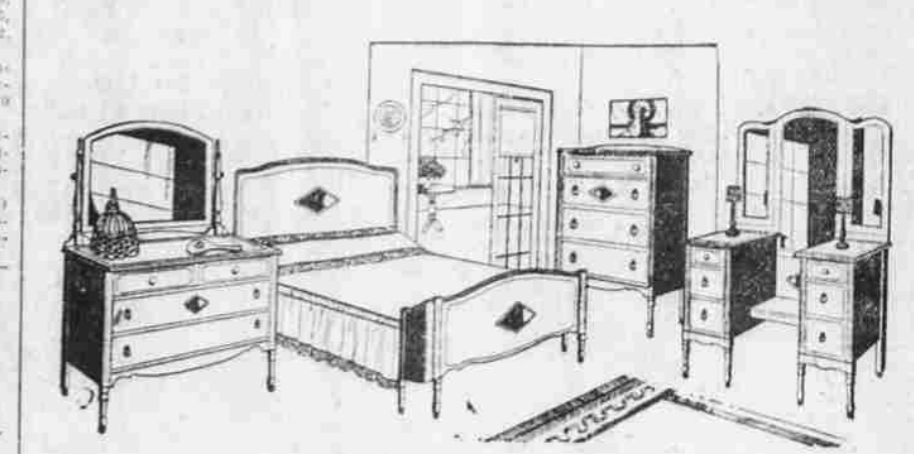

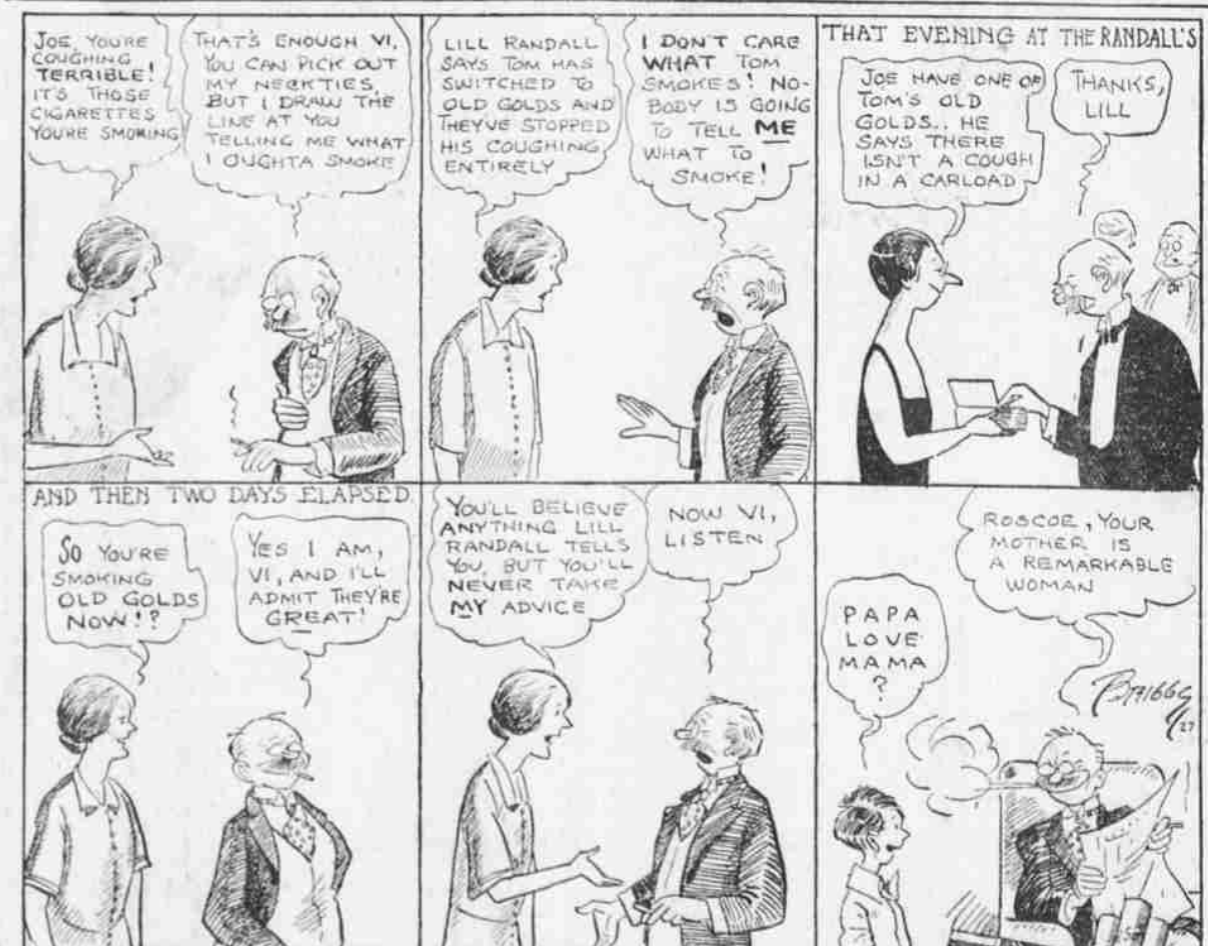
