

TO REMOVE SNOW FROM M'KENZIE

Highway Commission to Aid Nature in Clearing Pass for Motorists

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25 (AP)—The state highway commission decided today to aid nature in removing deep snow from the McKenzie Pass highway after receiving a report of a survey made Monday by Ray Conway, of the Oregon State Motor association, and Judge R. W. Sawyer, of Butte, snow plows will be put to work to hasten melting.

Lane county asked the commission to add to work on the Willamette highway, for which the county has \$255,000 bond money available. The commission indicated it preferred to press completion of other projects in which the county is interested.

The commission considered a request from the Eugene chamber of commerce that Triangle lake be prepared, as a park, for the summer season. The chamber is planning a mill at the lake, pointed out that \$1,000,000 worth of timber must find its outlet through the lake. They offered to sell for a park the timberland they had purchased from the state land board.

The commission announced that it would advise for the grading of the Lakeview-Shera's hill section of the Southern highway as soon as Lane county secures the right of way.

Wheat Outlook More Hopeful in Wallowa County

WALLOWA, Ore., May 25 (Blue-Print)—Weather conditions have been excellent in this section lately, with a cold northwest wind blowing and light showers of rain and little snow falling. Lindbergh Plans Brussels Flight

PARIS, May 25 (AP)—Charles Lindbergh, "the new ambassador of America," was introduced today to the French chamber of deputies today by Myron T. Herrick, "the temporary visiting ambassador." The American aviator received a tremendous ovation from the crowded chamber.

The reception was the most impressive formal function thus far of the American aviator's triumphant stay in Paris. Ferdinand Buisson, president of the chamber of deputies, at whose side stood Vice Presidents Pate and Lafont, greeted the hero.

The hero, dressed in a white suit, was escorted to the chamber by Deputy Colonel Pate, head of the group of war-militated known as the "broken ring" and amidst the entire membership of the chamber.

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Tule Lake Wheat Crop Curtailed

KIAMATH FALLS, May 25 (AP)—Grain operations on Tule lake are seriously curtailed by high water in the 50,000-acre lake, and as a result, the annual crop will be below that of last year, County Agent C. A. Henderson reported yesterday following a survey of the area.

"The west side of the lake is affected more than the east side," the agricultural pointed out. "Sowing of wheat is now out of the question, but if the water recedes immediately, the average may be seen to rise and barley."

Approximately 20,000 acres was sown to grain on Tule lake last year.

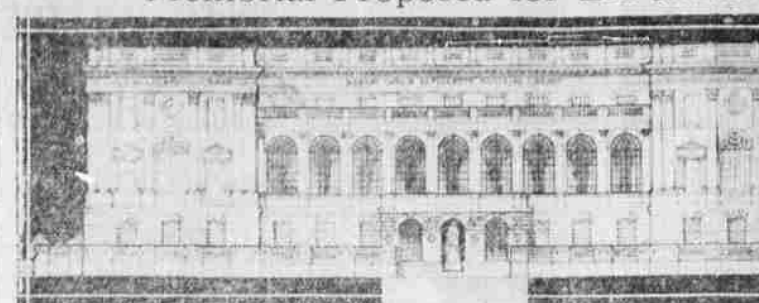
PIONEER DIES
