NEW CHURCHES MAKING HEADWAY

Undenominational and Interdenominational Institutions Show Gain

SAN FRANCISCO, May 26 (AP)—Undenominational and interdenominational churches are making sure headway in the United States, according to an official report presented to the Presbyterian general assembly by Dr. J. Ross Stevenson, of Princeton, N. J., chairman of the department of church cooperation and union.

Chairman Stevenson will report that the "undenominational and interdenominational type of church appears to be slowly but steadily increasing in numbers. It is found in the most part in small communities and is frequently organized as a protest against denominational rivalries in new communities. This type of church often is organized before any of our denominations have formed local units."

Seems Successful "The undenominational and interdenominational type seems to be successful," the report continues. "So far as the meeting of purely local religious needs is concerned. However, it is the almost unanimous opinion that neither the undenominational nor the interdenominational church meets its responsibilities in the wider range of obligation."

"This does not seem to be anything that can be done wisely so far as modification of our fundamental law is concerned to adjust our Presbyterian form of government to this present day movement. It is clear that when a church is undenominational in character, it is impossible for us to have strictly official contracts with it. With reference to the interdenominational organizations our form of government as recently amended would seem to give us all the latitude in this connection that is advisable."

As to local organizations which are known as community churches but which are in reality Presbyterian churches duly organized by our presbyteries and offered according to the requirements of our form of government and are upon the roll of one of our presbyteries, these, of course, are as definitely related to us in theory, and in most cases in practice, as if they bore the name Presbyterian. They carry the name Presbyterian in their charters, although the name may not be brought to the fore in the church's publicity."

ATHENS WOULD REVIVE REAL OLYMPIC GAMES (ATHENS)—Revival of the classical Olympic games in Athens in 1928 and every fourth year thereafter under the name "Pan-Athenian" is a proposal under consideration here.

The games would be supplementary to the regular Olympic events now held regularly every four years under the International Olympic Committee's jurisdiction and would comprise only the ancient Greek sports.

SOBRIETY SERMONS (NEW YORK)—Lindbergh and Tilden are regarded as "sobriety sermons" by Arthur J. Davis, superintendent of the State Anti-Saloon league.
